

Legislature Gets Ready for Move to “Old Courthouse”

After more than 80 years in its current location on the second floor of the County Courthouse, the County Legislature is preparing to move two buildings away—to the second floor of what has been known since 1931 as the “Old Courthouse.” The historic building, built in 1854, is the oldest Gothic Revival courthouse in New York State. Renovations have been in progress since earlier this spring, with the move scheduled to take place by July.

As well as removing the judge’s bench, benches, and other features of what had been the county’s Supreme Courtroom, and repainting the entire second floor space, walls have been erected to provide offices for the

Clerk and Chief Deputy Clerk of the Legislature; and a new glassed-in reception area has been created adjacent to the elevator. The Chambers will include new desks and chairs for Legislators, lighting in the existing chandelier fixtures has been upgraded, and the renovations include a new handicapped accessible bathroom on the second floor.

The capital project includes acoustical and audiovisual improvements—a microphone and speaker system, with accommodations for the hearing-impaired, and acoustical panels on the wall to improve sound quality in the room, as well as for the cable and webcasting of County meetings. The new AV system includes lighting to supplement the existing chandelier lighting, and new remote cameras and control facilities, replacing equipment that is more than 20 years old. The new “TV Room” will be located on the third floor balcony.

Last month, the Legislature approved the permanent renaming of the Old Courthouse as *The Governor Daniel D.*

Tompkins Building, in honor of Governor Tompkins, who served as Governor of New York State from 1807-1817. Founded in 1817, when the County committed to construct a wooden courthouse on the building’s site, Tompkins County was named for Governor Tompkins, who sponsored and signed into law legislation that forever abolished slavery in New York State.

County Mourns the Death of Nancy Zook


The Tompkins County Youth Services Department and the greater Ithaca community lost a dear friend and colleague on April 18th with the unexpected passing of Nancy Zook.

Her life's work was dedicated to children and youth, starting as a third grade teacher in California. After she moved to Ithaca in 1982, she worked with pregnant and parenting teens at the Child Development Council. During her 23 years as a Coordinator of Community Youth Services for Tompkins County, she helped develop, fund, monitor, and coordinate a wide variety of youth development and risk reduction programs including those for runaway and homeless youth.

She helped coordinate youth employment programs and services for children and families with multiple needs. She served as Chair of Tompkins County's Family Court Advisory Council and on the NYS Runaway and Homeless Youth Advisory Council, in addition to working closely with The Learning Web and Cornell on the Independent Living Survey conducted by and for homeless youth. In recognition of those efforts, she earned Challenge's Collaborator of the Year Award. She was passionate about working with people, always striving to bring them together to work toward the common good.

Nancy always saw the good in everyone. Her warm, friendly, and helpful personality enabled her to develop hundreds of positive working relationships with colleagues in public and private agencies throughout Tompkins County. Nancy had eclectic interests; she was an avid gardener and reader. She loved all birds, but especially parrots and shared her home with her three dachshunds. In recent years she loved making transatlantic crossings on the QEII with her husband Thom. Locally, Nancy is survived by her husband Thom Trause and daughter Caitlin Thomas Zook. Nancy will be greatly missed.

A memorial service to celebrate Nancy's life will be held on June 15th at Upper Treman Park. The County Youth Services Department will also host a celebration of Nancy's life in June; please call for details. 

Lead Poisoning: Are you at risk?

You may be aware that children at ages one and two are tested for their blood lead level at their physician's office as required by New York State law, but did you know that adults are also at risk for lead poisoning?

How does lead poisoning affect an adult?

Lead can affect almost every organ and system in your body. The main target for lead toxicity is the nervous system, both in adults and children. Long-term exposure of adults can result in decreased performance in some tests that measure functions of the nervous system. It may also cause weakness in fingers, wrists, or ankles. Lead exposure also causes small increases in blood pressure, particularly in middle-aged and older people, and can cause anemia. Exposure to high lead levels can severely damage the brain and kidneys in adults or children, and ultimately cause death. In pregnant women, high levels of exposure to lead may cause miscarriage. High-level exposure in men can damage the organs responsible for sperm production.

What is a high level?

- At levels above 80 µg/dL, serious, permanent health damage may occur (extremely dangerous).
- Between 40 and 80 µg/dL, serious health damage may be occurring, even if there are no symptoms (seriously elevated).
- Between 25 and 40 µg/dL, regular exposure is occurring. There is some evidence of potential physiologic problems (elevated).
- Between 10 and 25 µg/dL, lead is building up in the body and some exposure is occurring.

The typical level for U.S. adults is less than 10 µg/dL (mean = 3 µg/dL).

You may have been exposed to lead at work or at home or while engaged in a hobby.

At work:



- Construction workers
- Steel welders
- Bridge reconstruction workers
- Firing range instructors and cleaners
- Painters
- Remodelers and refinishers
- Foundry workers
- Scrap metal recyclers
- Auto repairers
- Cable splicers

There are also hobbies which may put you at risk:

- Casting bullets or fishing sinkers
- Home remodeling
- Target shooting at firing ranges
- Lead soldering
- Auto repair
- Stained glass making
- Glazed pottery making

Also, some traditional remedies, especially from Asia and orange colored, may contain lead as well. Please do not use leaded ceramicware.

Spring is here! You might want to consider testing your soil before planting your vegetable garden.

Remember: **NEVER** scrape, grind, or sand paint. Contact Tompkins County Environmental Health, at (607) 274-6688, before you work!

How can you reduce your exposure to lead?

- **Wash** your hands and face before you eat, drink, or smoke.
- **Eat, drink, and smoke** only in areas free of lead dust and fumes.
- **Wear** a clean, properly-fitted respirator with HEPA filter in all areas that have lead dust or fumes. Shave to get the best fit.
- **Change** into different clothes and shoes before engaging in work with lead. Keep your street clothes and shoes in a clean place.
- **Shower** after working with lead before you go home.
- **Launder** your clothes separately from other family members' clothes.



Talk to your health care provider, and know your blood lead level.

The drive-thru process couldn't be easier, as representatives from Clean Harbors Inc. take the products out of your vehicle while you stay behind the wheel! You can get more information and register for the next HHW Drop-Off Event May 18th by going on-line at www.recycletompkins.org. All you need is valid solid waste permit. Additional Drop-Off events are scheduled for July 20th, August 17th, October 19th and November 16th.

Did you know there are some easy ways to reduce waste at home and in the office?

- Narrow the margins of electronic documents to minimize the number of pages printed
- Reuse jars, mugs and small containers for drawer and desktop organizers
- Include 'please recycle' on envelopes and recyclable materials in mass mailings and advertising
- Reuse the back of junk mail, old cover sheets, outdated letterhead, faxes and old envelopes as scrap paper
- Cancel subscriptions that are duplicates or not being read
- Eliminate unwanted mail and phone books by signing up for a free account at www.catalogchoice.org
- Replace paper towels with reusable cloth cleaning rags
- Use foam packing peanuts, bubble wrap and other packing material over again




2012-2013 HEAP COOLING PROGRAM

It is hard to believe that spring and summer are just around the corner with the crazy weather we experience here in Tompkins County. While the 2012-2013 HEAP (Home Energy Assistance Program) heating program has ended, we would now like to introduce the **2012-2013 HEAP Cooling program**.



The HEAP Cooling program helps income eligible households with the purchase and installation of an energy efficient air conditioner or fans. The household must include an individual with a documented medical condition that is exacerbated by extreme heat, and all other eligibility criteria must be met.



The HEAP Cooling program opened on April 1, 2013, and will run until August 31, 2013, or until funds are exhausted, whichever comes first. Learn in advance of road construction projects. For rural Tompkins projects, contact your town highway supervisors directly. For County road information, go to: www.tompkins-co.org/highway. Ride TCAT with an employee bus pass provided at no charge to you for Tompkins County employees. Catch the bus close to home or leave your car at a TCAT Park-N- Ride. The application form is available on the Tompkins County homepage/intranet/Employee Resources/Forms. The process is quick, and the cost savings for a 30-minute ride to work is quickly noticed as a savings in your household budget.



Find your TCAT Route information using Ride14850, a free application, works with an iPhone, iPod, or iPod Touch device and operates as a trip planner. Simply enter the starting location and destination, and the application shows possible routes. Rideshare with coworkers and/or neighbors! If finding a ridesharing match is difficult given your schedule or location, try www.Zimride.com/Tompkins. It's an easy registration which may connect you with one of the over 3,000 Zimride users in and around Tompkins County. Rider Feedback provides you with insight on your potential match to help you evaluate the matched driver or rider, and payments can be made through PayPal. If biking is an option, on May 16th, there will be breakfast stations in Ithaca for bikers. Ithaca Carshare will sponsor a biker's breakfast station at Thompson Park.
