Welcome to Public Health Director Frank Kruppa

Tompkins County is happy to welcome Frank Kruppa as its Public Health Director. Frank was selected in March to the Health Department's top position after a year-long national search, and came on board in April.

A native of the Southern Tier, Frank most recently served as the County Health Officer and Administrator in Okeechobee County, Florida. He earned his Bachelor's degree in Environmental Studies from SUNY Binghamton and his Masters in Public Administration from Central Florida University.

Frank has the following message for County employees and retirees through *County Corridors*:



"It is hard to believe it has already been more than two months since I arrived in Tompkins County. Time has gone by quickly which, for me, is a good thing because my wife Andrea and our dog Smokey were in Florida until the middle of June.

After accepting the position of Public Health Director I realized it would be a coming home of sorts. I grew up in Windsor, just east of Binghamton, and lived there until I left for college in Florida. As I spent the majority of the last 17 years moving around Florida from Pensacola in the panhandle to Key West and places in between, I never lost the feeling that I belonged in New York.

General Weather Preparedness!

June 1st marked the official start of the 2011 North Atlantic hurricane season. Although Central NY is not usually directly affected by hurricanes, we have had our share of heavy rain and high winds, and all households (and businesses) should be prepared for potential weather emergencies, including power outages from thunder and lightning storms. Precautionary steps should always be taken to protect your loved ones and pets.



Emergency Preparedness Steps:

- *Special steps may be necessary and incorporated into emergency planning if a home consists of young children, senior citizens, and/or persons with disabilities or severe illnesses.*
- *Pet owners should make preparations with pet boarding facilities in the event of evacuation, since not all shelters or hotels welcome pets.*
- *Homeowners with homes at risk for flooding should review insurance policies, as they do not always cover flooding, etc.*
- *Bottled water, dry food, flashlights and radios (with a supply of appropriate batteries), clothing, and blankets should be stocked for the entire household.*

How to Prevent Lyme Disease and Other Tick-Borne Infections

It's that time of year again where disease carrying ticks are active and "biting" in Tompkins County. You can prevent Lyme disease and other tick-borne infection by avoiding tick bites by taking the following precautions:

- Wearing light colored clothing to spot ticks easily.
- Wearing closed shoes, long pants and long sleeved shirt.
- Tucking pant legs into socks.
- Considering using repellent with DEET and follow instructions on label.
- Checking clothes and any exposed skin frequently for ticks while outdoors.
- Avoiding contacting vegetation.
- Avoiding sitting directly on ground or on stone walls.
- Keeping long hair tied back.
- Doing a final, full-body tick check at the end of the day on yourself, your children, and pets.

If you find a tick:

- Carefully remove it by grasping the mouth parts close to the skin with tweezers and gently pull the tick out in a steady, upward motion.
- Disinfect the site with soap and water, rubbing alcohol, or hydrogen peroxide.
- Do not use kerosene, Vaseline, a match or other methods to remove tick.
- Estimate the length of time the tick was attached and contact your Health Care Provider (HCP) within 24 hours with this information. Your HCP will determine if antibiotic treatment is necessary.
- ~~You may bring the tick to Tompkins County Health Department (TCHD) for Free Tick ID provided by NYSDOH which identifies the species and degree of feeding but will not test for Lyme bacteria. Results are available within 2 weeks. Call a TCHD Nurse at 274-6604 for this and other TICK and LYME Disease information. *~~

Sustainability Spotlight:

2010 Tompkins County Sustainability Team Report and Highlights

The County Sustainability Team made great progress in 2010 to reduce energy use and waste, increase environmental purchasing, and introduce renewables and green building standards to County buildings. Here are a few of the key highlights of the programs and achievements toward County government sustainability in 2010.

On the facilities front:

- The new Health Department building at Brown Road, completed in 2010, is expected to receive LEED Silver certification by November 2011.
- This followed a comprehensive reuse model of disposition of the Biggs B building—former Health Department location—which utilized the County's new Waste Reduction policy.
- Also, i010, solar thermal hot water heating was added at the Solid Waste facility, the Health Department building, and Mental Health Building.



Several new developments in waste reduction include:

- Two tons of organic waste was composted in 2010 at the Public Works and Solid Waste facility.
- A three-year contract was signed in October 2010 with Challenge Industries to shred confidential documents for the County and in the first two months of the program, five tons of material was shredded and recycled.
- Waste assessments for all County departments were completed in 2010, giving Solid Waste a good sense of waste and recycling patterns, by facility.
- Contractual agreements were successfully completed in 2010 to launch single stream recycling in 2011 at County facilities and in the community.

The County continues to focus on purchasing products that are environmentally friendly and works in partnership with other local municipalities and organizations to coordinate environmental purchasing:

- In 2010, municipalities were presented with information about how to purchase green products from the County contract at a TCCOG meeting.
- The County Highway Division is now using biodiesel and plans to use it year-round, which is anticipated to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in the Highway fleet.
- Kicking off the County's new Green Fleet Policy, the County purchased three Prius hybrid vehicles in 2010, which were partially funded through an ARRA (federal stimulus) grant through NYSERDA. Several departments have also purchased more efficient vehicles as a result of this policy.

Look for a focus this year on how staff can be more involved in sustainability!

Tompkins County Compliance Program

You may have heard that Tompkins County over the past several months has been developing a Corporate Compliance Program. You may have been wondering what a “Corporate Compliance Program” is and what it means for all of us in county government—and also perhaps why we are referring to “corporate” compliance, when Tompkins County is a government.

This article provides a brief introduction to the program, seeks to answer basic questions, and indicates where to go to find out further information.

What is a Corporate Compliance Program?

A corporate compliance program is a formal program that affirms an organization’s principles, practices, and structure to ensure its compliance with all applicable laws, rules, and regulations; it also specifies the process used to prevent and detect any violations. This ongoing, proactive program demonstrates how the organization will operate in a fully legal and ethical manner, and how its code-of-conduct will be applied to address specific organizational risks. (As used here, the term “corporate” means “all-encompassing.”)

What’s in the County’s program and how was it developed?

The County’s commitment to compliance is nothing new; what *is* new is implementing a formal program for all of county government. Tompkins County’s Compliance Program integrates legal and internal compliance efforts from throughout county government to meet organizational objectives, mitigate risk, assure quality, and improve our performance. Our plan addresses such factors as Compliance Program oversight; related policies, procedures, and training; how areas of risk will be identified, and any problems reported, and corrected, as needed.

For the past several months, a County Compliance Committee, working with Deputy County Administrator Paula Younger (the County’s Compliance Officer), have been developing the program, which will be presented to the County Legislature for adoption at the Legislature’s August 2 meeting.

The Compliance Committee is made up of Social Services Commissioner Patricia Carey, Mental Health Director Bob DeLuca, Personnel Commissioner Anita Fitzpatrick, Public Health Director Frank Krupa, ITS Director Greg Potter, Finance Director David Squires, and County Attorney Jonathan Wood.

Among elements of the program are two new policies, a confidential Compliance Helpline, and required training for all—including legislators, department/division managers, and employees. The Compliance Helpline has been established to receive allegations of illegal or unethical conduct involving County employees and officials. (The Helpline number is 877–348–1396.)

Recognizing Probation’s Role in Public Safety

The American Probation and Parole Association has declared July 17-July 23, 2011 as a week of recognition for the work done by Probation and Parole Officers in providing supervision to offenders in the community—and for very good reason. There are over 120,000 individuals on probation alone in New York State. This number is more than the combined total of parolees



and individuals incarcerated in the prison system. Probation is the largest alternative to incarceration program available to the courts and provides a crucial service in the justice system.

In Tompkins County, the Department of Probation and Community Justice is responsible for the oversight of approximately 750 individuals who are on some form of court-ordered supervision. These include youth and adults in the family court system and adults who have been convicted of misdemeanor or felony offenses in the criminal courts. Probation Officers are agents of the court and are responsible for ensuring that court ordered conditions are being met. To do this, Probation Officers provide direction, guidance, and mentoring in face-to-face supervision appointments. We address ambivalence, encourage change, reinforce positive behavior, and confront behavior that is not conducive to a successful probation outcome.

Probation Officers hold offenders accountable by ensuring that financial restitution is being paid to victims and community service is completed. Probation Officers are in communication with family members, employers, schools and treatment providers to assess compliance. We perform school visits to our youth and unannounced home visits after hours and on weekends to confirm compliance with probation conditions. Probation Officers investigate and approve housing for sex offenders and verify addresses quarterly to ensure compliance with the sex offender registry. We perform bar checks to make sure our DWI population is not drinking or driving without a license, or putting the community in danger by doing both. Probation Officers monitor compliance with Ignition Interlock, conduct urine testing to ascertain drug use, take breath samples to determine alcohol use, and install ankle bracelets that monitor alcohol use 24/7. We track and restrict an offender's movements in the community via electronic monitoring bracelets and monitor an offender's internet use through software. We collect DNA samples for the NYS Databank.

Probation Officers continually assess the risk to community safety during the course of providing supervision. While guided by our belief that all offenders have the potential to make positive changes in their lives, our responsibility is to respond quickly to violations of court-ordered conditions that put the public at risk by seeking court intervention and warrants for arrest if necessary. Probation is a key component of the juvenile and adult justice systems, and we make a difference in our community. I hope you will join me in recognizing the work that Probation Officers do every day in keeping our community safe while promoting offender accountability and change. Improvements to the Civil Service Application and Examination Processes

In order to enhance our customer service, we are implementing a new online application process expected in July/August of 2011 that will introduce an easier way to submit job applications. This secure website will enable you to become a registered user and submit electronic applications for vacancies and examinations.



Once you have registered and your application is submitted, you will have the ability to:

- track your applications online,
- have a complete history of previous applications,
- be able to quickly submit new applications with a click of a button,
- review your eligible lists,
- check your exam scores,
- complete the training and experience exams at the time of application
- sign up to receive email notifications of new examinations and vacancies in your area(s) of interest as they are posted,
- receive all correspondence via email.

These are the details we have so far, and we will keep you updated via email with new details as the project progresses and we establish a "go live" date.

Along with the new application process, we are also introducing some changes to our examination program. As of July 1, we have the ability to conduct monthly testing in-house in our computerized testing facility located in the Old Jail building for select titles such as Keyboard Specialist, Account Clerk Typist, Sr. Typist, Clerk/Library Clerk, Caseworker, Public Health Technician, Mail Clerk, and Wastewater Treatment Plant Operator.

Youth and Family Services Partners With Therapeutic After-School Program

Youth and Family Services in Tompkins County DSS work with youth who are considered at-risk and are often involved with the court system or probation. We help at risk youth succeed in school, the community, and in the home. To be successful, we collaborate and partner with several agencies. One of these agencies is The Therapeutic After-School Program, which is located at The William George Agency for Children's Services, Inc. in Freeville.

The program staff at the Therapeutic After-School Program works with youth and their families to prevent placement of the youth outside of the home, and help develop a therapeutic relationship between the youth and their families. They provide youth with individual and group-based mental health counseling, substance abuse services, and counseling regarding sexually offending/reactive behaviors. They have access to on-site psychiatric services, and there is a full-time day school on site as well. Families participate in monthly family support nights. They also provide families with after hours and weekend on-call support.

Youth who participate in this program often show a decrease in their delinquent or criminal behavior, are able to maintain in the home, and show an increase in school attendance and academic performance. In 2010, 79% of the youth participating in this program did not engage in delinquent or criminal behavior; 84% were able to remain in the home and did not change their living environments; 100% showed an improvement in school attendance; and 88% showed an increase in their academic performance.

The youth's success is formally celebrated twice a year, along with families and siblings, with a holiday party in December and a summer picnic in July. Families have enjoyed these events, where there are several activities and recreational events that assist youth and their families in developing a therapeutic relationship.

TCAT has a Summer Fun Pass for youth ages 6-17 at the cost of \$50.00 and the pass will provide unlimited TCAT bus transportation from July 1st to August 31. The pass may be purchased online at www.tcatbus.com or by phone at 607-277-RIDE (7433).

For teens in the Town of Enfield or Town of Newfield, CityVan can provide a ride to Ithaca High School, site of Drivers Education classes, or other locations within Ithaca, such as the library and worksites along Route 13, at the cost of \$2.00 one-way per youth up to age of 17 and \$3.00 ages 18 and older.

CityVan transportation is available Monday-Friday, for all ages, from early morning to late afternoon. For your summer travel, car or plane is most frequently used; however, there are other means of travel available. If you are not in need of a car at the end of your destination, AMTRAK provides extensive coverage of the East Coast and across the country, with the nearest station in Syracuse to board the Maple Leaf Line to New York City and further destinations on AMTRAK. Help save 3 lives by donating 1 pint of your blood

August 2rd Tompkins County Public Library 11:00 am – 4:00 pm

From the Red Cross.....

Registration

Our staff and volunteers will sign you in and go over basic eligibility and donation information. You will read information about donating blood, and will be asked to show a donor card, driver's license, or other form(s) of ID.

Health History & Mini-Physical

You will answer some questions during a private and confidential interview about your health history and places you have traveled. We will check your temperature, pulse, blood pressure and hemoglobin level present in a sample of blood.

The Donation

We will cleanse an area on your arm and insert a brand new sterile needle for the blood draw. This feels like a quick pinch and is over in seconds. The actual donation takes about 8-10 minutes, during which you will be seated comfortably. Certain donation types, such as platelets, red cells or plasma (apheresis donations) can take up to 2 hours. When approximately a pint of blood has been collected, the donation is complete and a staff person will place a bandage on your arm.

Snack Time

After donating, you should have a snack and something to drink in the refreshments area. You can leave the site after 10-15 minutes and continue with your normal daily activities. Enjoy the feeling of accomplishment knowing that you have helped save lives.




CONGRATULATIONS...


