Call to Order: Ms. Black called the regular meeting of the Board of Health (BOH) to order at noon.

Privilege of the Floor: Anthony Pitts, Assistant General Manager at Holiday Inn Express in Ithaca informed the Board that he is responsible for the operation of the pool in addition to several other responsibilities. He was made aware that he needed to take a test to be a pool-certified operator to continue to maintain the pool. He took the test in May but unfortunately did not pass and is scheduled to retake it on July 12th.

Approval of April 22, 2024, and May 28, 2024, Minutes: Dr. Koppel moved to approve April 22, 2024, and May 28, 2024, minutes; second by Ms. Merkel. All were in favor of approving the April 22, 2024, and May 28, 2024, minutes as written; with 2 members abstaining; and the motion carried.

Financial Summary: Mr. Kruppa reported on behalf of Mr. Porter. He said there was nothing out of the ordinary to report and the financials are on track.

Medical Director's Report and Discussion: In addition to his written report Dr. Klepack reported that no Avian influenza cases have been reported in New York State as of the date of the board meeting.

Regarding our substance use crisis and overdose deaths, he mentioned that he presented at the Ithaca Rotary about harm reduction as a concept in public health strategy. He believes the presentation was well received. He received questions from the audience about the future of the detoxification center on Triphammer Road and CARS's relationship to harm reduction.

Administration Report: Mr. Kruppa reported that they are in the midst of the budget season. The BOH does not have jurisdiction over the budget but policy jurisdiction which influences the budget. The maintenance of effort budget was submitted into the system last week. They are working on a 5% reduction budget which is due July 8th. The 5% reduction is only the County portion which is \$300,000. The reduction will not affect any existing staff or existing programs. The two vacant Community Health Nurse positions will be included in the 5% reduction with the rest coming from operational lines. The Legislature makes final budget approvals in November. The budget will be public when the County Administrator submits the budget to the legislature early in September and available for all on the website.

Division for Community Health (DCH) Report: Ms. Buckwalter had nothing to add to her written report included in the packet.

Health Promotion Program Report: Ms. Hillson introduced Tamrie Oliver who is a new community health worker and working in HIP (Healthy Infants Partnership)/Perinatal and Infant Community Health Collaborative (PICHC) program. She also introduced Kathryn Gaddie who is in her second year of Cornell's MPH program working with TCWH as a summer intern. A mural is being painted downtown commemorating community public health efforts and honoring those we lost to COVID-19.

Children with Special Care Needs (CSCN) Report: Ms. Clark Manderville reported that the Legislature passed their resolution last week for the OTR funds to be used to offer stipends and recruit and retain providers. They are onboarding a new speech pathologist who will start July 22nd.

Environmental Health (EH) Report: Ms. Cameron reported that she approved the City of Ithaca's final work plan (copies provided) in response to the notice of violation in the encampment area. The City has completed phases 1 and 2 of the 3-phase work plan. Phase 3 is planned to be completed in the fall after receiving permits from NYSDOH and when the water levels are low. The final report will be released shortly in response to a FOIL request.

Outreach workers had informed individuals of the notice of violation before it was issued, and no individuals were found in the area when the City began clean-up activities. Ms. Cameron will meet with city officials over the summer to discuss their new policy and conduct an assessment of the situation.

The installation of fences close to the railroad bridge should discourage individuals from bringing large items (e.g., shopping carts) into the area again. The Railroad has a physical presence in the area and is aware if there are any changes on the property. The City and the Railroad worked closely together on this issue. The City will use the Encampment Response Protocol if anyone is found camping in the area.

There was a lengthy conversation about hard-to-house individuals, housing, and shelter situations. It is a significant community concern that is being addressed by many key players in the community.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

Enforcement Actions:

Draft Resolution #EH-ENF-24-0006 - Brew 22 Coffee and Espresso, Violations of Subparts 5-1 of the New York State Sanitary Code (Public Water) (Postponed from April and May – penalty deadline modified) (5 mins.) – Dr. Koppel moved to accept the resolution as written; seconded by Dr. de Lima.

Ms. Cameron explained that this was a violation of previous BOH orders and explained that the proposed penalty of \$8,700 is due to several violations including missing samples, failure to notify EH, and submitting falsified laboratory reports.

All were in favor; the vote to approve the resolution as written was unanimous.

Draft Resolution #EH-ENF-24-0003 - Hanshaw Village MHP, Violation of Part 17 & Subpart 5-1 of the New York State Sanitary Code (Mobile Home Park/Public Water) (Postponed from May – deadlines modified) (5 mins.) – Ms. Touchton moved to accept the resolution as written; seconded by Dr. Koppel.

Ms. Cameron explained that this was a violation of the NYS Sanitary Code for Water Supply. The current resolution contains various modifications to provide adequate drinking water. A stipulation agreement was signed by Hanshaw Village MHP which included the deadline requirements. The \$1,500 proposed penalty was extended to August 15, 2024, to accommodate approval at today's meeting.

All were in favor; the vote to approve the resolution as written was unanimous.

Draft Resolution #EH-ENF-24-0008 - D.P. Dough Ithaca, Violations of Subparts 14-1 of the New York State Sanitary Code (Food Service) – Ms. Merkel moved to accept the resolution as written; seconded by Ms. Touchton.

Ms. Cameron explained that this is a violation of the NYS Food Service Sanitary Code for failing to provide food thermometers to accurately evaluate food temperatures. Environmental Health proposes a penalty of \$400 due August 15, 2024.

All were in favor; the vote to approve the resolution as written was unanimous.

Draft Resolution #EH-ENF-24-0009 - Holiday Inn Express Pool - Violations of Board of Health Orders and Subpart 6-1 of the New York State Sanitary Code (Swimming Pool) — Ms. Touchton moved to accept the resolution as written; seconded by Merkel.

Ms. Cameron explained that this was a violation of previous BOH orders. Holiday Inn Express failed to comply with previous requirements to obtain pool operator certification. Environmental Health proposed a penalty of \$250 due August 15, 2024, plus an additional \$250 if the pool certification is not obtained and submitted to EH. She noted that pool inspections indicate that the pool is being operated correctly.

All were in favor; the vote to approve the resolution as written was unanimous.

ADMINISTRATION:

<u>EH Refund Policy</u> (Postponed from May) – Ms. Cameron explained that the \$25 refund processing fee is being removed from the refund policy for administrative efficiency.

Dr. de Lima moved to accept the proposal as written; seconded by Dr. Koppel. All were in favor; the vote to approve the policy as written was unanimous.

<u>EH Division Fees for 2025</u> (Postponed from May) – Ms. Camerson explained that this is for the Board's information and will be approved by the County as part of the budget process. No approval is needed but it is an opportunity for the Board to ask questions or provide comments.

She referred to "Revised Recommended Environmental Health Division Fees for 2025" dated June 13, 2024, which addressed the proposed facility operating and plan review fees and other revenue projections for 2025. Minor modifications to the Onsite Wastewater Treatment System (OWTS) fees were proposed.

Onsite Wastewater Treatments System (OWTS) Waiver Request: 175 Williams Glen Road, Ithaca

A waiver from the Tompkins County Sanitary Code (TCSC) is required if someone wants to install an onsite wastewater treatment system (OWTS) where municipal sewer is available. Ms. Cameron explained that the Town of Ithaca also requires a waiver in order to construct an OWTS where connection to a municipal sewage system is available. 175 Williams Glen Road is located close to a municipal system but due to the complications of the site, it is extremely expensive to connect to it. The owners were granted a waiver from the connection by the Town of Ithaca. EH also supports their request for a waiver from the TCSC.

Ms. Merkel moved to accept the waiver request as written; seconded by Dr. de Lima. All were in favor; the vote to approve the waiver request as written was unanimous.

Mr. Kruppa said we should plan not to have a July meeting when asked by Ms. Cameron in preparation for deadlines.

The next meeting is potentially on Tuesday, July 23rd, 2024 @ noon.

Whole Health Highlights

- We also held our twice-yearly All-Staff Meeting in June. Staff gathered at Brown Road for a day full of events and activities, including Narcan training (offered in partnership with REACH), Zero Suicide training/presentation, and more.
- We held a "CFT Kick Off" meeting on June 4th for our new Cross-Functional Teams (CFTs)! Our active CFTs are now: DEIB 2.0, Communications, Internal Efficiency, and Client-Needs. We are so excited to see the work these teams can do!

Shared Topics Update

Strategic Planning/Merger

CULTURE:

Align the organization around our shared mission and values-based culture to create an empowered, engaged, and cohesive team.

 The Community Health Improvement Steering Committee held a kick-off meeting with community partners on Friday, June 7. The CHI Tompkins (Community Health Improvement) process will result in our community health assessment and improvement plan at the end of 2025. The meeting presented a community vision statement following several weeks of community input:

"Our community is a diverse and dynamic mosaic of people across the lifespan. Shared spaces and natural beauty are central to our community, fostering care and belonging.

We envision a community where everyone thrives, regardless of background, income, or abilities. We aspire to focus on prevention and health promotion through accessible healthcare, inclusive spaces, and resources that meet everyone's basic needs. Our community desires collaboration, traumainformed care, safety, resilience, environmental stewardship, and elevation of marginalized voices. We seek comprehensive well-being that encompasses physical, mental, and social needs."

INTEGRATION:

Merge the department structures to become one organization and increase our ability to better serve our clients and community.

We brought onboard Ashley Siegard as our Staff Retention and Human Resources Coordinator.
 In her role she will be able to support both our locations on HR related processes, helping to minimize the administrative burden on many of our directors and supervisors. Ashley will also

- support our department on a host of other relevant and important endeavors, including helping staff to navigate onboarding and systems like civil service.
- In June we held the first meeting for the Tompkins County Narcan Partnership Meeting! This is a great group of community partners who operate Opioid Overdose Prevention Programs (OOPPs), including TCWH. The partnership will allow us to have better communication and understanding of Narcan training and distribution in our community.

COMMUNITY:

Strengthen the collaborative effort within Tompkins County to equitably impact individual and population health.

DATA:

Review and establish effective data collection to measure programmatic, organizational and county progress towards achieving our priorities.

Highlights

COMMUNICABLE DISEASE

- Summary of notable communicable disease investigations in June:
 - Campylobacter- 5 cases: one with chronic GI issues, three from wounds, one with chronic health issues, possible exposure to undercooked chicken
 - E. Coli-1 case: concurrently infected with Anaplasmosis, 85 yo, hospitalized overnight, reported eating out frequently
 - o Giardia-1 case: works for NYS parks, unknown exposure
 - Salmonella-1 case: ate at many places, was treated with antibiotics, not hospitalized
 - Strep Pneumoniae-1 case: hospitalized for 7 days
 - Legionella-1 case: 83 yo, hospitalized twice during this illness, ended up admitted for 3 days. Sputum sample sent to Wadsworth, resulted as Serogroup 1
 - Anaplasmosis-26 cases: one person passed away, continues to cause serious symptoms and hospitalizations, particularly in the elderly
 - o Babesiosis-4 cases: two of the four were hospitalized

IMMUNIZATIONS

- 11 children and 1 adult were vaccinated in our June immunization clinics.
- 2 TSTs were administered in the month of June.

STAFFING

- CHS currently has openings for two Community Health Nurses and a Senior Community Health Nurse. These positions were open for applications from 6-13-24 to 7-13-24. Several candidates applied and interviews are scheduled.
- Staffing difficulties are impacting service delivery in all of our programs, so we are hoping to fill these positions soon.

WIC

- Caseload is down slightly in June. Our July caseload data won't be available until August. Staffing was a challenge in June which impacted appointment availability.
- We served 392 individuals in June.

Program Updates

SAFECARE PROGRAM

- We received one new SafeCare referral in June. An admission visit is scheduled for July 12th.
- We have one family currently receiving services and progressing through the program.

MOMS PLUS+

- Gail Birnbaum attended the NYS Perinatal Association Conference in Albany June 6-7th 2024. Topics included health disparities for African American perinatal clients, substance use in the perinatal population, and infectious disease and pregnancy.
- Nurses completed 39 home visits in the month of June which included 14 new admissions to the program.
- Rachel Buckwalter, Caryl Silberman and Gail Birnbaum did outreach for the Moms PLUS+ program at the Ithaca Festival on June 1st. The community group LATCH (Lactation Alliance for Tompkins County Health) provided a booth for parents to feed their children or change a diaper.
 Whole Health programs that serve families provided outreach materials for this booth.

RABIES

- 56 rabies vaccines were administered in the month of June. Most exposures were due to bats.
- Coordination between CHS, EH and CMC ER is ongoing to improve communication and case management of patients authorized for rabies post-exposure prophylaxis.

LEAD

- There are 17 children currently admitted in this program. No new admissions or discharges in the month of June.
- The Lead Poisoning Prevention Network met on June 20th. We are pleased to have a lead intern for the summer (working in Health Promotion), Kathryn Gaddie, who will work on getting lead banners hung on buildings around Tompkins County to increase awareness of sources of lead and the need for lead testing at ages 1 and 2.

HIV

- 2 HIV tests were done at Whole Health in June
- We were unable to send a nurse to do HIV testing at STAP during the month of June due to short staffing.

Highlights

- Samantha Hillson & Shannon Alvord presented at Cornell's FUSE International Conference on June 11, 2024. The theme of the conference was "putting the *public* back in public health"; Hillson & Alvord presented on outreach and engagement activities conducted during the pandemic that transitioned into our full-time Community Health Worker program.
- The CHI Tompkins (Community Health Improvement process) Kick-off event took place on June 7, 2024 at the Tompkins County Public Library.
- The COVID-19 Community Resilience Mural was painted on the Human Services Annex Building, located at 214 W Martin Luther King Jr./State St. Artists Britt Johnson and Efren Rebugio spent the week painting the mural, learning about our local response to COVID-19, and the ways in which the community came together. STAFFING

- Kathryn Gaddie started as an intern. She is going into her second year in the Cornell MPH program. Kat will be working on lead poisoning prevention.
- Planning to hire for an open Community Health Worker position.

Program Updates

HEALTHY NEIGHBORHOODS PROGRAM

- HNP staff canvassed in Dryden at Little Creek mobile home park, in efforts to spread awareness of program information and resources.
- HNP staff assisted in tabling at a PRIDE event in efforts to spread awareness of inclusivity of HNP

TOBACCO FREE TOMPKINS COUNTY

- Currently collaborating with TCAT transportation to provide updated smoke-free/vape-free signage. Hoping to incorporate smoke-free/vape-free messaging at bus stops and shelters most frequented by students.
- The County was notified of JUUL settlement funds that are being distributed to NYS counties and some school districts to confront increased use of nicotine use in youth and young adults. TCWH will be convening partners to develop a plan for the funds.

COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKER (CHW) AND PICHC PROGRAMS

- On June 21, 2024, in partnership with Dr. Nia Nunn and the Human Services Coalition, we hosted a presentation and discussion of the Sister Circle event held in April 2024. Participants of the Sister Circle for Black mothers, TCWH staff (including Health Promotion and Community Health Services), and community health care providers came together to better understand this framework and the findings from the Sister Circle event. A final visual product is underway and planning for future Sister Circles.
- Delivered materials surrounding the heat advisory during the week of June 17th, including cooling centers, heat exhaustion and heat stroke symptoms, and dealing with excessive heat while pregnant.

COMMUNITY HEALTH ASSESSMENT (CHA) & COMMUNITY HEALTH IMPROVEMENT PLAN (CHIP)

- CHI Tompkins Kick-off was held on June 7, 2024. The event was attended by 64 community
 partners who engaged in reviewing the first phase of the MAPP 2.0 framework and participated
 in a community engagement exercise. The exercise is based on the Spectrum of Community
 Engagement to Ownership developed by Facilitating Power, Spectrum of Community
 Engagement to Ownership Facilitating Power.
- Phase 2 of the Mapp 2.0 framework has launched and the Steering Committee is reviewing the three assessments. An Assessment Design Team will be developed to include community members and partners who have expertise in community engagement, data collection methods, and analysis to support he assessments.

COMMUNICATIONS

- Cross-collaboration with CHS, EH, Preparedness Coordinator and Dept of Emergency Response to coordinate Extreme Heat Advisory efforts during the week of June 17.
- Launch of the Communication Cross Functional Team; to meet bi-weekly.

Highlights

Staff Training:

- All staff have started EI Hub trainings every other week as a group with more in-person and online trainings coming available by the state— EI Hub Launch date was moved back until October 15th
- All provider meeting was held on 6/14/24 with many therapists in attendance

Program Updates

EARLY INTERVENTION

- SLP hired by the county has been offered the position and has accepted with an anticipated start
 of Mid July.
- The proposal for the reallocation of funds to keep 2 positions and to allow for current providers to receive a stipend per service rendered, including ongoing services and evaluations has been approved by the legislator. Creating contacts with all therapists are in the works.
- Early Intervention experiencing wait lists for all specialties.
- Speech (46) Feeding (2), OT (16), PT (11), SI (29), SW (4)
- Referrals received June: 17
- EI has made efforts to make relationships with core teams outside of the county. Currently we are working with CTN who has agreed to send a core evaluation team to the county and do all day evaluations at TCWH. We have also established relationships with Liberty Post in Syracuse and have gotten slots for families to travel there for evaluations as well.
- Starting in September we will only have one evaluation agency in our area doing evaluations as Affinity Rehab is losing their OT.
- Currently we are outside of our 45-day indicators for most of the children we serve.
- Currently serving 201 active/qualified children in Early Intervention. 2 Total Child Find Cases
- One position for a Community Health Nurse remains open.


