Call to Order: Dr. Moylan called the regular meeting of the Board of Health (BOH) to order at noon.

Privilege of the Floor: None

Approval of August 27, 2024, BOH Minutes: Ms. Black moved to approve August 27, 2024, minutes, second by Ms. Merkel. All were in favor of approving the August 27, 2024, minutes and the motion carried.

Financial Summary: Mr. Kruppa reported on behalf of Mr. Porter. Proactive efforts have been taken to manage the budget funds and necessary adjustments will be made before the end of the year. They do not have the opportunity to use rollover funds as they have in the past.

Medical Director's Report and Discussion: Dr. Klepack was not present. Mr. Kruppa reported on his behalf. He referred to the report included in the package and was available to answer questions.

Ms. Merkel was interested in the overdose prevention centers Dr. Klepack included in his report. Mr. Kruppa responded that Dr. Klepack is very interested in the centers and is involved in community conversations and public presentations, but there have been no changes in the community.

Administration Report: Mr. Kruppa reported that Tompkins County Whole Health presented its 2025 budget proposal to the legislature last week, which went well. He hopes the Maintenance of Effort budget will continue even with the existing Over-Target Requests (OTR). The legislature is challenged by the impact of new fund balance policies, tax rate increases, and large capital projects, which leaves no extra fund balance monies.

Ms. Black added that with sales tax revenue down 3-8% in 2023 and no more ARPA funds for some operations and special programs, there is less money in the budget.

Mr. Kruppa clarified the structure of the Whole Health internal tracking of public health and mental health budgets. Because the County's system can't give them the information needed, they keep internal budget tracking for public health. Mental health does not have the same type of system as yet. As new systems are incorporated, they will meet the needs of both.

Division for Community Health (DCH) Report: Ms. Buckwalter had nothing to add to her report included in the packet. She introduced newly hired Senior Community Health Nurse, Susan Laratta. Three other nurses were recently hired in September.

Health Promotion Program Report: Ms. Hillson reported that the 2025 Public Health Partnership Conference will be held from April 30th through May 2nd at the newly opened Ithaca Conference Center. Topics to be addressed include inequities, social determinants of health, environmental health and climate health adaptation, emergency preparedness and response, digital health and health innovation, health workforce resilience and burnout, and public health communication and misinformation. Organizations were encouraged to make submissions by October 18, 2024, on relevant topics.

Children with Special Care Needs (CSCN) Report: Ms. Clark Manderville had nothing to add to her written report included in the packet. She reported that the speech pathologist decreased the waitlist from 50 to 27. They are working with NYS to contract with interested providers who want to start in the early intervention program.

Environmental Health (EH) Report: Ms. Cameron was not present. Mr. Shea reported on her behalf and had nothing to add to the written report included in the packet.

Mr. Kruppa noted that starting October 16, 2024, public water systems must comply, with the Lead Service Lines and Copper Rule requirements. There is no funding to help property owners replace their lines, as the connecting lines to the homes or businesses end at the meter and are the property owner's responsibility. Mr. Shea said the water supplier will notify individuals who need to replace their lead lines, once the inventory is complete.

Ms. Black added that she attended a conference and there were conversations about the necessary upgrades to the infrastructure. The federal government has set aside billions of dollars but is very

concerned about the shortage of steamfitters and plumbers for this work to be done throughout the entire United States

Dr. Moylan appreciated the report summarizing the impacts on the EH division and the opportunities for public outreach and awareness of the new regulations.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

Enforcement Actions:

Draft Revised Resolution #EH-ENF-24-0012 - Best Western University Inn Pool, Violation of Subpart 6-1 of the New York State Sanitary Code (Swimming Pool) (5 mins.) – Ms. Black moved to accept the resolution as written; seconded by Ms. Touchton.

All were in favor; the vote to approve the resolution as written was unanimous.

Other Administrative Actions:

Dr. Moylan thanked Ms. Susan Merkel for her many years of service to the community. She is stepping down from her seat on the BOH and was presented with a certificate of appreciation.

Establish a Nominating Committee – Mr. Kruppa stated that a nominating committee must be established for Ms. Merkel's vacant seat and a recommendation for Dr. de Lima's seat on the BOH whose term ends 12/31/2024. Dr. de Lima has expressed interest in reapplying for her seat.

The nominating committee will:

- 1. Review the applications
- 2. Select applicants to interview
- 3. Conduct interviews (during the interview the nominating committee will give their perspective on serving on the BOH along with established questions)
- 4. Make a recommendation to the BOH

The BOH will forward the recommendation to the legislature for final approval.

Dr. Moylan, Ms. Black, and Ms. Touchton volunteered for the 2024 BOH Nominating Committee. Dr. Moylan will reach out to Dr. Koppel and Mr. Kingra to see if either is interested.

The next meeting is on Tuesday, October 22nd, 2024 @ noon.

MEDICAL DIRECTOR REPORT

September 2024 Report | BOH Meeting October 22, 2024

Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE),

EEE, a mosquito-borne viral infection, has caused one human death this year in NYS. We hadn't had this tragedy occur in many years. As another marker of this year's EEE severity, more than 20 horses have been found to be infected, and a great number of pools of water have been found to have EEE-infected mosquitoes.

We created media releases to inform the public that the only strategy we have is to prevent mosquito bites and we informed them about how to do it. The weather is turning colder as I write. Last night we had a near frost. Once we have a few nights of frost mosquitoes will fall in population. Hopefully this will occur without further human infections.

Demographic Shifts and Public Health

On Tuesday, October 1st, I attended a workshop to generate ideas for our region regarding the demographic change predicted in the coming generation (from now until 2040). In that time period, the US population is predicted to plateau. Were it not for immigration our population would decline. Since the number of persons will become the same at every age from youngest to oldest significant public health, economic, business, and service challenges will result. We have been so used to having far more young people compared to the elderly population that it is difficult to conceive of a world where that no longer will be the case. The meeting was hosted by the Office for the Aging, and it is expected that the ideas generated will prompt further meetings and more ideas.

Trends in Covid

Anecdotally at a recent music event, the band asked its audience to raise their hand if they have been recently infected. Approximately half the audience did so. This middle to late summer/early fall wave was not as severe as the prior year's but did put many out of work and school for some time and, undoubtedly, resulted in a number more cases of that malady – long-term Covid. It is predicted that we will see a winter wave as well. With that possibility the 2024-5 new formulation of Covid vaccine comes at a strategically important time. If our population would get this vaccine this fall, they would be in a good position to minimize their risk during this winter's wave.

Long-term Covid means, too often, long-term loss of income, brain fog, fatigue, cough, and a host of other costly and unpleasant symptoms. Covid is to be avoided since each case is a roll of the dice as to whether a person will suffer symptoms that last months and possibly years.

Since NYS has had no locally acquired Dengue cases the 6 reported cases are presumed to be in travelers to endemic areas.

LYME DISEASE

Appears poised to hit a new high. <u>Adult</u> tick season is starting now. These ticks are twice as likely to be infected compared to the ticks of spring and early summer. Adult ticks are larger and more likely to be seen by your patient. Precautions against ticks will continue to be important unless our temperatures are well below 35 F.

M-POX

Has not reared its head again so far locally.

PERTUSSIS

Having an upsurge statewide, and our region is no exception although many of the cases outside our region have been far more numerous. Cases have been unusually prevalent in college students. The acellular pertussis vaccine introduced in the mid-1990s seems to have less "staying" power compared to the cellular pertussis that was phased out due to side effects. Boosting with acellular pertussis may need to be more frequent.

RSV

Became a reportable disease last fall. We are just now beginning to establish a baseline.

SYPHILIS

Seems to be a bit lower for the second year.

MARBURG

On September 27, 2024, the Ministry of Health of the Republic of Rwanda reported cases of Marburg Virus Disease (Marburg), a rare, severe viral hemorrhagic fever, in health facilities in the country. These are the first known cases of Marburg in Rwanda.

To screen travelers Rwandan travelers will be routed to Chicago (ORD), New York (JFK), and Washington D.C. (IAD) airports. Public health entry screening is part of a layered approach that, when used with other public health measures already in place to detect ill arriving travelers, can slow and reduce the spread of disease into the United States. The risk of the Marburg virus in the U.S. remains low.

Additionally, the CDC is using an automated system to send general Marburg health text messages to international air travelers arriving from Rwanda. Text messaging allows the CDC to provide relevant and timely public health information and instructions directly to travelers and further facilitates future communication between travelers and public health officials. Travelers will receive text messages after arriving in the United States from Rwanda. The text messages will include information about symptoms and advise travelers on what to do if they feel sick. Travelers should watch for symptoms until 21 days after they leave the outbreak area.

On October 7, CDC issued a <u>Level 3 Travel Health Notice</u> for Rwanda, which includes recommendations for people travel to Rwanda to Reconsider Nonessential Travel, and on October 3, CDC issued a <u>Health Alert</u> to clinicians and issued <u>interim recommendations</u> for public health management of U.S.-based healthcare personnel who were present in a healthcare facility in Rwanda in the previous 21 days.

WEST NILE

Total cases YTD = 9 outside of NYC. This year we are well in excess of prior years for cases.

AVIAN INFLUENZA

Positive cow herds for **avian influenza** continue to increase nationally. No linkage in human cases have been found. So far, <u>no</u> herds positive in NYS.

Whole Health Highlights

- County budget deliberation have to date include all OTRs except for two CHN positions and the rural community outreach workers. The budget will not be final until a full Legislature vote in November.
- The Commissioner and Director of Health Promotion attended a health equity dinner sponsored by CHS and Cornell's Brooks School. Conversations centered around areas for collaboration and identification of some next steps to continue the conversation.

Strategic Planning/Merger

INTEGRATION:

Merge the department structures to become one organization and increase our ability to better serve our clients and community.

- Our Client-Needs team is working towards a Client Needs Analysis. So far, the team has been
 working to identify partner organizations we may be able to survey about client
 needs/perceptions and identifying what information to collect and assess from community
 members.
- Our Internal Efficiency team is working towards sending out a survey to staff to assess areas
 where efficiency (related to technologies/processes) could potentially be streamlined/improved.
 This team has been collaborating with other CFTs to ensure the survey is administered using
 best practices and have a plan to share results back with staff, which is exciting!

CULTURE:

Align the organization around our shared mission and values-based culture to create an empowered, engaged, and cohesive team.

COMMUNITY:

Strengthen the collaborative effort within Tompkins County to equitably impact individual and population health.

DATA:

Review and establish effective data collection to measure programmatic, organizational and county progress towards achieving our priorities.

Our DEIB CFT has been working to improve our demographic data collection. The team sent out
a survey to gauge support needed by staff when it comes to asking clients demographic
questions. Next, this team will be looking at defining the demographic indicators that TCWH will
use uniformly, and will be working to also standardize the demographic questions asked by staff.

CSB Update

- Cayuga Health Systems presented on the affiliation with Arnott and the impacts on Mental Health and substance use services.
- Commissioner reported on selection of Cayuga Health Services for the detox and crisis stabilization RFP. CHS has also received approval to apply for an Intensive crisis Stabilization center to be housed at the Triphammer facility.

Highlights

Communicable Disease

Notable communicable disease investigations in September:

- Campylobacter 4 cases: 2 cases had campylobacter in wounds; the other 2 cases were a 7 yo and a 20 yo with GI symptoms and no known cause
- Cryptosporidiosis –1 case: 77 yo with co-morbidities, hospitalized for 7 days
- Giardia 3 cases: the case histories included food consumption in England, in Boston, and from a local festival
- Salmonella 2 cases: 1 case, a 3 yo, who consumed raw eggs in Italy; 1 case, 68 yo with a backyard flock of chickens, transferred to Upstate with severe symptoms and hospitalized for 5 days; made full recovery
- Pertussis 1 case: The case is a vaccinated college student which led to 6 other probable cases (household contacts), which will be reported in October. There are many reported pertussis cases across New York State.
- Yersiniosis 1 case: 39 yo with chronic GI issues over a year, unknown cause
- Anaplasmosis 13 cases, notable were two elderly cases with co-morbidities and hospitalizations of 5 and 13 days
- Babesiosis 4 cases: 1 case co-infected with Lyme, another co-infected with Anaplasmosis

IMMUNIZATIONS

- The back to school immunization rush this year resulted in a very high volume of clients seen in our on-site Friday immunization clinic. We opened extra clinics on Tuesdays and ran double clinics with two nurses to accommodate the demand. There were 74 child immunization appointments at our clinic in September of 2024. To compare, we had 43 child immunization appointments in September of 2023.
- Many of the families seen here for immunizations struggle with barriers to accessing healthcare
 including lack of transportation, lack of insurance, no primary care provider, or a new arrival to
 the state/country. We work closely with school nurses and local pediatric offices to help provide
 resources and connect these families with needed services.

STAFFING

 We are pleased to report that Rose Goosen has accepted the offer for the community health nurse position vacated when Deb Axtell retired. Rose will start on November 12th. She will be working mainly in maternal child health and will also be trained in SafeCare and immunizations.

MOBILE CLINICS

- We are planning 5 Covid/flu mobile clinics in October for vulnerable populations within
 Tompkins County (elderly, new immigrants/refugees). So far we have clinics planned at McGraw
 House, Lifelong, Juniper Manor (Trumansburg), Ellis Hollow Apartments, and Open Doors
 English. We will be providing flu vaccine, high dose flu vaccine and the 2024-2025 Moderna
 Covid vaccine at these clinics.
- On September 26th we provided an Mpox vaccine clinic at STAP Ithaca. Seven people received
 the first dose of Jynneos vaccine at this clinic. A second dose clinic is planned for October 24th.
 We continue to offer Jynneos at our on-site Friday immunization clinic.

WIC

- The Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (FMNP) is ending 9/30/24. Participants will still be able
 to redeem their coupons at local farmers markets in Tompkins County through November 30th.
 This year we issued 1120 booklets, each worth \$25.00 totaling 28,000 of potential revenue for
 farmers.
- National WIC Association is excited to present the 2024 State of WIC Report, marking 50 years of improving maternal and child health across the U.S.
- In September we serve 482 individuals, accommodated 78 same day appointments and 21 people that had scheduled appointments and didn't show.

Program Updates

SAFECARE PROGRAM

- 2 clients are currently enrolled in this program and are progressing through the program with regular home visits.
- October is SafeCare accreditation month. We will be working with the National SafeCare Training and Research Center to have our program accredited for 2025.

MOMS PLUS+

- Caryl Silberman, senior community health nurse, attended a Lunch and Learn with LATCH
 partners and OBGYN staff on Sept 23, 2024. She talked with providers about how Moms PLUS+
 can help pregnant and postpartum clients.
- New CHN Emily Baker started 9/3 who will be 50% MOMS+ and 50% CD. Emily is working on becoming a certified lactation counselor.
- MOMS nurses completed 57 home visits in September 2024. This is an increase from 49 visits in August 2024.
- There were 58 referrals made to the MOMS Plus+ program during September 2024, an increase from 41 referrals in August 2024.
- There were 16 new admissions to the MOMS Plus+ program in September 2024, up from 15 in August 2024.

• There are currently 57 clients enrolled in MOMS Plus+ as of the end of September 2024, about the same as the previous month.

RABIES

• CHS nurses administered 27 rabies vaccines to patients in the month of September. While most of the exposures were still due to bats, there were also several that were attributable to dog bites (dog's status was unable to be verified) as well as from a wildlife bite.

LEAD

- We are planning several events for Lead Poisoning Prevention Week which is October 20-26, 2024. There will be a lead awareness door hanger campaign in Groton on Oct 26th and a lead testing event at ReUse on Oct 22.
- There are currently 21 children receiving nursing case management for elevated blood lead levels. There were 2 new admissions in September.

HIV

• CHS nurses did 1 HIV test at STAP and 1 HIV test at Brown Rd clinic in the month of September.

TCAT RABIES CLINIC:




