What's a Unique Natural Area (UNA)? UNAs are special places identified by the Tompkins County Environmental Management Council (EMC), a group that advises the county on environmental issues. These areas are recognized for their outstanding natural features, like rare plants or unique geological formations. It's important to note that UNA is a descriptive term and does not confer any legal protection or regulatory status.

We have recently updated the UNA boundaries to reflect changes such as:

- Following parcel lines, the edges of mature vegetation, wetlands, or contour lines
- Removing farm fields or developed land
- Incorporating areas with documented rare plants

What does this mean for you?

Being in a UNA does not restrict your property rights or development options. It's simply an informational tool from the EMC to help you understand the unique value of your land.
