APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Tompkins County Board of Health April 23, 2024 12:00 Noon Rice Conference Room and via Zoom

Call to Order: Dr. Moylan called the regular meeting of the Board of Health (BOH) to order at noon.

Privilege of the Floor: None

Approval of March 25, 2024, Minutes: Ms. Merkel moved to approve March 25, 2024, minutes; second by Mr. Ravinder. The vote to approve the March 25, 2024, meeting minutes as written was unanimous; the motion carried.

Financial Summary: Mr. Kruppa reported on behalf of Mr. Porter who is out on medical leave. The staff is working on finalizing the 2023 budget.

Medical Director's Report and Discussion: Dr. Klepack had nothing to add to his written report.

Administration Report: Mr. Kruppa reported that the County is updating the webpage which includes Whole Health and should be fully launched by the end of the calendar year without interruption in accessing the BOH public documents. County Finance is updating the process of purchasing requirements for Request For Proposals (RFP).

Division for Community Health (DCH) Report: Ms. Buckwalter had nothing to add to her written report. DCH is looking to fill the senior nurse position and asked for referrals or recommendations.

Health Promotion Program Report: Ms. Hillson reported that community visioning boards have been displayed throughout the County for community residents to provide input to the Tompkins County Community Health Improvement Process (CHI Tompkins). Virtual and live events are being held for more engagement and input from the community with a focus on the two questions below.

- 1. What is their ideal vision for the vision for the health of our community?
- 2. What do they feel are the overlapping identities that make up our community?

The summary of input and ideas collected will shape the one vision statement to guide the CHI Tompkins process.

Children with Special Care Needs (CSCN) Report: Ms. Clark Manderville reported they are interviewing for a speech-language therapist in-house position. The new billing platform the state is launching (Early Intervention Hub) will launch on October 15th of this year. Mr. Kruppa added that they are looking to submit an alternative proposal to County Administration that would allow the hiring of more needed speech therapists for the County through other funding or a stipend due to insufficient State funding, despite a 5% rate increase from the State budget.

Environmental Health Report: Mr. Shea had nothing to add to the written report. Ms. Black asked to explain fees regarding a fee to a homeowner. He described the standard fees and noted that it is uncommon to see replacement system plans from an outside engineer to do the work that the Health Department requires unless EH needs to make a referral to an outside engineer due to extreme complexity. Mr. Shea is unsure how the homeowner found out there was a problem with their sewage system and there are no reduced fees for an outside engineer.

Ms. Black moved to refund the homeowner the permit \$190 fee; seconded by Mr. Ravinder.

Discussion: The homeowner has the option to use an outside engineer/contractor. The EH fee schedules, processes, and contract information have always been listed on the website. Mr. Kruppa added that EH thoroughly explained the process to the homeowner and they were receptive but the EH team will look further into the matter. He feels it may have been a misunderstanding between the homeowner and the contracted engineer.

Four were opposed to refunding the permit fee, and three were in favor; the motion failed to pass.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

Enforcement Actions:

Draft Resolution #EH-ENF-24-0002 – Ithaca Press, Violations of Subpart 14-1 of the New York State Sanitary Code (Food Service) – Ms. Merkel moved to accept the motion as written; seconded by Dr. Koppel.

No discussion.

All were in favor; the vote to approve the resolution as written was unanimous.

Draft Resolution #EH-ENF-24-0006 – Brew 22 Coffee, Violations of Subpart 5-1 of the New York State Sanitary Code (Public Water) – Ms. Black moved to accept the motion as written; seconded by Ms. Touchton.

Discussion: Ms. Merkel asked for an explanation of the fees. Mr. Kruppa could not fully explain all the fines totaling \$8,700 in significant multiple violations that include unverifiable water sample reports and many other missed reports.

It was decided that this matter be tabled and heard again at next month's meeting.

OTHER ACTIONS

Encampment Notice of Violation Update:

Mr. Kruppa shared an update on the encampment situation that resulted in the issuance of a Notice of Violation to the City of Ithaca and the railroad in the area bordering Tabor Street and the railroad tracks which negatively impacts the waterways. The City and the railroad responded well and agreed to develop a plan and clean up the affected area. The notice of violation gave both entities 30 days to submit the plan to Environmental Health from the issuance of the violation. He added that the City recently posted keepout signs, and some cleanup has begun and looks forward to a sustainable proposal from the City for the land to be sanitarily maintained.

Whole Health's Overdose Follow-Up Presentation:

Mr. Kruppa provided a follow-up and update on Whole Health's response, data collection, and communication strategies related to opioid overdoses.

Tompkins County opioid information, data, and resources can be found on the Whole Health webpage at Opioid Use and Resources | Tompkins County NY.

Communication strategies include issuing press releases on topics of mental health and substance use disorder issues in the community, alerting the community of fentanyl being laced in drug supplies, updating the community, informing about available resources, avenues of support, community initiatives, Requests for Proposals (RFPs), data on opioid-related overdose deaths regularly, via TV, radio, and newspapers.

Data is posted regularly on the website with a recent posting around demographics on unintentional overdose deaths.

911 Call for Overdose Emergency - The 911 Center provides overdose/poisoning call data based on the type of emergency. The Community Justice Center, which is involved in public safety reform, recently put out a data page that has more information about the 911 Call Center. The Sheriff's Office and the Ithaca Police Department also have data on their web pages.

Drug-Related Deaths Data - Based on records filed by the Tompkins County Medical Examiner. The data is an aggregate of the last five years (2019 – 2023) identified by a variety of demographics.

Unintentional Fatal Overdoses – Includes those for which the manner of death is classified as an accident and substance identified in a toxicology screening is ruled as the immediate cause of death. The data was broken down into several categories. He noted that individuals working in food service under the

occupation category were higher than expected and this identified population group will be investigated and addressed differently as they are disproportionately affected.

They are looking at non-fatal overdoses with conversations with Cayuga Health Partners to get their data on individuals entering the emergency room.

Drug-Related Deaths – Includes all deaths in which drugs are involved. In these cases, the immediate cause of death is not or not solely drugs, and drugs are often listed under "Other significant contributions." These also include those in which the manner of death is not ruled as an accident.

Opioid Quarterly Reports - The summary of Tompkins County Data Published April 2024 is slightly behind as it comes from New York State quarterly but helps in how resources are targeted. Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) – Mr. Kruppa reviewed the community plan areas of CHIP which focused on Promoting Well-Being and Preventing Substance Use Disorders and Mental and Substance Use Disorders Prevention and their goals.

The community plan is designed to be a road map of how the community addresses issues and how we can help improve them. CHIP 2022 – 2024 can be found on the webpage at CHACHIP2022-TompCo-TOC-CHIP.pdf (tompkinscountyny.gov).

The Tompkins Mental Hygiene Local Services Plan for 2024-2028 was developed by a workgroup composed of the Chair of the Community Services Board, the Chair and Co-Chairs of the Mental Health, Substance Use and Developmental Disabilities Subcommittees, and the Director of Community Services. The workgroup solicited feedback from community members, local provider agencies, and the Community Service Board and subcommittee members through a Local Services Plan Priority Needs Survey conducted in May and June 2023. The Local Services Plan can be found at <u>Tompkins County Whole Health Local Services Plan (tompkinscountyny.gov)</u>

Local Services Plan Goal Areas:

- 1. Workforce
- 2. Housing
- 3. Crisis Services
- 4. Cross System Services
- 5. Non-Clinical Supports
- 6. Adverse Childhood Experiences
- 7. Transition Age Services

The biggest challenge is the shortage of available workers including social workers, psychiatrists, peers, etc. from the research and work of Developmental Disabilities, Mental Health, and Substance Use subcommittees. Housing is a primary problem.

New Initiatives

- > Expanded Opioid Overdose Prevention Program from Green Street to Brown Road
- ➤ Launched Dual response CARE Team program with the Sheriff's Office and Ithaca Police Department
- Received pilot funds from OMH to Outreach Worker program to rural parts of the county

- Advocate for and received funds from TC legislature to continue the program
- Facilitate an RFP process to find a vendor to administer the program
- ➤ Facilitated County Opioid Settlement Funds Task Force distribution of \$725,000 to community organizations
- ➤ Led the Community Services Board to create a rapid housing and crisis services program using Opioid Settlement Funds

Avian influenza update

Avian Influenza continues to be an issue, but there are no additional human cases after the 1 case in Texas, and no new dairy farms have tested positive lately. NYS continues to have no cases and no known avian flu in mammals. It has been proven that pasteurization renders milk safe to drink. Raw milk consumption is discouraged, and it is recommended to adequately cook beef (to 145 degrees F or higher). Those temperatures have been shown to inactivate any virus.

NYSDOH is reported to be working closely with the NYS Dept. of Agriculture and Markets (similar to the collaboration between the CDC and USDA), and with the CDC.

Guidance has been put out regarding the disease and the use of PPE on farms. Backyard poultry hobbyists have had information reinforcing hygiene. NYDOH is doing webinars on the disease for practitioners, dairy farm owners/operators, and downstream handlers of raw milk

National surveillance and investigation have been limited by political/economic/business issues. Public health has been criticized for not being aggressive enough, but its actions have been curtailed in key states. The dairy industry is an important sector of the U.S. economy. In those key states, it is reported that concerns about adverse impacts on businesses ranging from farming through milk product production have led to restrictions being imposed on CDC, and USDA surveillance and investigatory activities.

Wastewater surveillance is ongoing and is capable of detecting influenza A. (Avian influenza is an "A" virus.) It is felt that fluctuations in levels can be a marker of avian influenza (H5.N1) however the test does not identify Avian flu per se and it cannot identify whether the source of the A antigen is human animal, or milk (and other products) that are discarded down the drain and into the wastewater stream (remember that even pasteurized milk can test positive for avian flu antigen even though it is not infectious). We are at an early stage in the maturation of our understanding and use of wastewater data.

Economic benefits have been extended to farmers and the system of milk and dairy product production and delivery. Such as:

- Reimbursement for lost milk
- Coverage for the cost of testing and surveillance

But to keep farmers and producers "whole" (and thus encourage their participation in surveillance programs) reimbursement would have to cover other losses such as the drop in monetary value resulting from an animal testing positive. Without adequate compensation, there is a disincentive for cooperation.

Influenza update

CDC has preliminarily classified this season as <u>moderately severe nationally</u>. Related graphics are <u>in the Appendix</u>.

NYSDOH Commissioner Dr. MacDonald spoke about his efforts to integrate Health Equity into the departments hiring practices and programmatic decisions. His theme was that there is much work to do to improve equitable health outcomes across NYS.

Shared Topics Update

Strategic Planning/Merger

Department Senior Leadership has approved charters for 4 Cross Functional Teams to begin in June. The teams are working on Client Needs, Internal Efficiency, Communications and Diversity, equity, Inclusion and Belonging. We are currently recruiting staff participation and expect each team will have their first meeting sometime in June.

What is a Cross Functional Team? They are the mechanism we use to work on deliverable action steps from our strategic plan. They are made up of staff from across the department with a self identified facilitator and a Senior Leadership mentor. The groups work from a charter that guides their activities but grants them freedom to determine the path.

CSB Update

Highlights

COVID VACCINE CLINICS

- Two homebound vaccine clinics occurred in the month of April. On April 22nd, CHS nurses provided a Covid vaccination clinic at Brookdale Memory Care. 21 clients were vaccinated. On April 25th, CHS nurses provided a Covid vaccination clinic at McGraw House. 14 clients were vaccinated.
- These clients could not access vaccination elsewhere and were grateful for the mobile immunization services provided by CHS.

COMMUNITY EDUCATION

• On April 23rd, CHS Director Rachel Buckwalter presented an overview of CHS services to the Finger Lakes Office Manager's Association monthly meeting. This included instructions on how to report communicable diseases, immunization services offered and how to make a referral to our home visiting programs.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASE

- Summary of notable communicable disease investigations in April:
 - Campylobacter--3 cases:
 - 21 y/o with travel to London
 - 45 y/o Florida vacation
 - 38 y/o infection in abscess (not travel related)
 - Dengue- 1 case: 47 y/o who travelled to Guadeloupe (whole family had it but their numbers will be reflected for May)
 - Pertussis- 1 case: 8 y/o, home-schooled, had 4 out of 5 recommended pertussiscontaining vaccines (under immunized), no other contacts besides family, they were all treated with antibiotics
 - Salmonella--2 cases:
 - 20 y/o with travel to Mexico
 - 77 y/o not travel related
 - Strep, Group A Invasive--2 cases:
 - 46 y/o, hospitalized, co-morbidities, recovered
 - 68 y/o, hospitalized, many co-morbidities, month long hospital stay & discharged
 - Strep Pneumoniae, Invasive 1 case: 54yo, hospitalized, recovered.

STAFFING

 There are currently three open positions within CHS: one senior community health nurse and two community health nurses. There are several applicants for these positions. Interviews and reference checks have been completed. The hiring process is progressing with the hope that offers can be made within the next few weeks, pending certified lists from Human Resources.

ORAL HEALTH

• The Tompkins County Youth Oral Health Survey closed to the public on April 12th. Over 500 community members completed this survey. We are now analyzing survey data and will provide a detailed report regarding the results of the survey.

WIC

- NYSDOH contracted Hunger Solutions New York to promote WIC enrollment and participation. Our Agency was selected and will begin this project in May.
- WIC agency served 487 people in the month of April.

Program Updates

MOMS PLUS+

- Moms PLUS+ nurses completed 59 home visits in the month of April which is an increase from last month's total visit number (44).
- Active caseload for Moms PLUS+ is also increasing. Currently there are 57 people enrolled in the program.
- The Moms PLUS+ team had a presentation on April 11th from Healthy Families, a new program in Tompkins County that focuses on teaching families about child development and parenting skills. Healthy Families accepts referrals for pregnant people and any family with a child under the age of three months. They provide home visits and family support until the child is 5 years old. We are excited to partner with this program as they expand and grow in Tompkins County.

RABIES

5 Tompkins County residents were authorized to receive rabies post-exposure prophylaxis in the
month of April. This included a family of three exposed to a bat in their home, a person who was
bitten by a dog while traveling internationally and a person exposed to a confirmed rabies
positive raccoon.

HIV

• Two HIV tests were completed at TCWH in the month of April.

STAFFING

Interview process began to hire a Community Health Worker.

Program Updates

HEALTHY NEIGHBORHOODS PROGRAM

- HNP staff conducted a home visit with someone who is nearly deaf and completely blind. HNP
 staff helped the client learn about the fire extinguisher that was given and how to use it by
 guiding their hands over the extinguisher and describing what they were feeling and the process
 they would need to follow if they ever needed to use the extinguisher.
- HNP staff conducted 2 home visits in the month of April where the homes were tested for lead
 paint and the tests were positive. One of the homes is in process of becoming a registered day
 care. Information about lead paint safety was distributed at both visits.
- HNP and Environmental Health had a discussion about the potential for HNP to incorporate well
 water sampling into the scope. NYS is conducting a pilot in several other counties and is
 evaluating interest of HNP programs to incorporate this service.

TOBACCO FREE TOMPKINS COUNTY

- The Anti-Vaping campaign was successfully implemented into schools and community spaces throughout Ithaca and Dryden
 - The QR code linking users to student support resources and peer support groups was scanned over 200+ throughout the month of April
 - Ithaca Journal covered the campaign on the April 22 issue in both digital and print formats

COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKER (CHW) AND HIP TOMPKINS (PICHC) PROGRAMS

• Sister Circle: Birthing Stories by Black Women, a project of the HiP Tompkins Community Action Board (CAB) and facilitated by Dr. Nia Nunn, took place on 4/19/24. This event was a collaboration between TCWH, Human Services Coalition, and Dr. Nunn. Dr. Nunn is compiling

video and recording from the gathering to create a digital product, recommendations, and material to share during a professional development learning opportunity in June.

• CHW and HiP Tompkins programs discharged 8 clients in the month of April.

COMMUNITY HEALTH ASSESSMENT (CHA) & COMMUNITY HEALTH IMPROVEMENT PLAN (CHIP)

- Community Visioning Boards (6) were placed around the county for at least a one-week rotation.
- A virtual Community Visioning event was held on 5/2/24.
- Planning for kick-off event in June with community partners and completion of Phase 1.

COMMUNICATIONS

- Preparation for county-wide website upgrade; review of content across the department
- Developing updated COVID-19 Vaccination marketing: F. Kruppa recorded radio spots for spring;

 All staff have started EI Hub trainings every other week as a group – EI Hub Launch date was moved back until October 15th.

Program Updates

Early Intervention

- Early Intervention Provider shortage continues: Budget to hire 2 Speech Therapist, 1 Special Instruction Teacher, 1 Physical Therapist
- Currently the postings remain open, one interview with an SLP has been done.
- There have been limited responses to the positions and the department is currently under discussion about presenting a new proposal, proposal being drafted and sent for approval.
- A survey was sent out to all EI providers, current and past, in March. The results were reviewed, complied together, and taken into consideration for the new proposal.
- Early Intervention experiencing wait lists for all specialties: Speech (45), Feeding (1), OT (17), PT (8), SI (22), SW (4).
- Currently serving 190 active/qualified children in Early Intervention. 6 Total Child Find Cases
- One position for a Community Health Nurse remains open.

EI REFERRALS

- Received in March: 31
- El referrals received today are not able to have a core evaluation done until August or September of 2024 as there are only 4 core slots available each week. NYS had a 45-day timeline from date of referral to evaluation date. We are outside this indicator for every case.
- We reached out to past agencies that had contracted with us for cores, one is interested and is looking at their availability.

Highlights

VILLAGE OF DRYDEN BWO:

A HUGE shout out to Scott Freyburger and Skip Parr in Environmental Health for dealing with our firstever village-wide Boil Water Order on a Friday evening. On May 3rd, Dryden's Superintendent of Public Works notified Scott of a significant water main break potentially caused by a fiber optic drill striking a water line on W. Main St. Consequently, water pressure decreased in areas of the village, including the Dryden High School who cancelled after-school activities. If water pressure is low for more than 4 hours, contamination may enter the water supply and a Boil Water Order needs to be issued. The break was identified around 2:30 pm and repairs weren't completed within 4 hours. Consequently, the Village issued a precautionary Boil Water Order around 5:30. While Scott went to Dryden to investigate the situation and assist restaurants, the school district, and other public facilities dealing with this situation, Skip worked on drafting the official Boil Water Order (BWO) with written instructions, requirements for the BWO to be lifted, and additional information for food service establishments, and the official BWO notification was issued to the Village. The location of the leak was identified, and the Village repaired the water line later that evening. Acceptable bacteria samples are required to lift the BWO, but commercial labs are closed on the weekends. A big shout out to Bolton Point water supply. Bolton Point has a certified laboratory and Bolton Point staff came in over the weekend to run samples for the Village of Dryden. The Village collected samples on Saturday and Sunday, and EH released the BWO at 10:30 on Monday morning when satisfactory sample results were received. Great job and a huge thank you to the Village, EH staff and Bolton Point in their handling of this unique and challenging situation and protecting the public until safe drinking water conditions could be restored!

CITY ENCAMPMENT NOV:

In response to the Notice of Violation issued by EH, on April 24, the City of Ithaca in coordination with Watco-Ithaca Central Railroad submitted a draft "Workplan for Clean Up of Former Encampment Site." EH provided comments requesting some clarification and minor revisions. The City was waiting for comments from NYSDEC prior to finalizing the report, who provided comments on May 15. The plan includes three phases: Phase 1 involves the installation of fencing around the area; Phase 2 involves waste segregation, clean up and disposal; and Phase 3 addresses the cleanup of the waterway banks and shoreline. Phases 1 and 2 can occur simultaneously. Phase 3 will occur later this fall when water levels are lower and after any needed NYSDEC permits are obtained. The City has reported that the cleanup is underway.

MEETING AT NATE'S MOBILE HOME PARK:

In response to a request from the management of Nate's Mobile Home Park, Adriel Shea and Liz Cameron met with park management and residents on May 7. Nate's is adjacent to parts of the Ithaca homeless encampment, and residents expressed a range of concerns connected to the encampment. Most of the concerns are beyond the authority of Environmental Health; however, EH agreed to provide a list of contacts for complaints and concerns in a variety of areas. The residents expressed support for and were appreciative of the recent Notices of Violation that required cleanup of one part of the encampment.

CORNELL CHILDREN'S CAMP CHANGES:

Historically, Cornell has allowed summer academic Children's Camps to operate under Cornell's educational accreditation. As such, those programs did not previously meet the definition of Children's Camps and did not require a permit through our office. During an internal audit conducted by Cornell several years ago, Cornell determined that the university was not directly overseeing many of the camps operating on their campus and was inadvertently assuming risk for minors who were not under their supervision. As a result of this, Cornell determined that operation of these camps is not a function of the University and that these camps need to independently obtain NYSDOH Children's Camp permits unless otherwise exempt. This change led to the addition of several Childrens Camps permits at Cornell in 2023 and approximately eight more in 2024. None of these camps were previously permitted through our office and have not had to comply with NYSDOH regulations in the past. Some of the camps may not be able to obtain permits due partly to issues obtaining a Camp Health Director and other requirements.

HIGHLY PATHOGENIC AVIAN FLU:


EHS Cameron Cowburn attended the ASTHO (Association of State and Territorial Health Officials) webinar on April 25, and prepared a summary of the webinar. Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI), now referred to as H5N1 by NYSDOH, is a is a fast spreading and highly lethal disease amongst wild and domesticated bird populations. It has become a growing concern in recent months due to a cross-over event where it is believed that wild birds introduced the disease to bovine populations in Texas. The first detection in the United States occurred in January 2022 in wild birds, followed by detection in domesticated poultry in February of that year. In April of 2022, the first human case in the US was reported.

H5N1 has become a growing concern in the last few months. It has been detected at 33 farms across 8 states in the US. Experts have so far determined that the main form of transfer is through raw milk and mammary tissue. This has led it to spread more easily among dairy cattle with little to no known detection among beef livestock. On April 1, 2024, the first case of H5N1 in humans linked to cattle was reported in Texas. The person affected reported mild symptoms and since then no other human cases have been reported. Due to the recent discovery of transmission to humans through cows, experts from the USDA, CDC, ASPR, NIH, and FDA are all working to understand and prevent the spread of this potentially deadly disease. No action is currently needed at the local level.

CEHD SPRING MEETING:

Skip Parr and Liz Cameron attended the Spring meeting of the Conference of Environmental Health Directors. Topics discussed included an electronic platform that NYSDOH is looking into as a replacement to ehips (Electronic Health Information Permitting Systems); a rabies exposure to a rabid kitten involving 100 people in Rockland; a discussion of their ATUPA program by Rensselaer; a FOIL (Freedom of Information Law) presentation by NYSDOH; and updates from the NYSDOH Center for Environmental Health.

Whereas, on September 8, 2021, Tompkins County Board of Health Resolution #EH-ENF-21-0010 ordered Brew 22 to submit quarterly total coliform results, monthly operating reports and an annual nitrate sample as required by Subpart 5-1; **and**

Whereas, TCEH did not receive total coliform sample results for the 3rd and 4th quarters of 2022, and did not receive total coliform sample results the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th quarters total coliform sample result for 2021; **and**

Whereas, TCEH did not receive annual nitrate sample results for 2022 and 2023; and

Whereas, on March 14, 2024, TCEH performed a water system inspection at Brew 22 and observed the UV system was not properly functioning and TCEH issued a Boil Water Order; and

Whereas, on March 15, 2024, TCEH received a total coliform sample result submitted for compliance purposes with a collection date of November 2023; and

Whereas, on March 19, 2024, TCEH received a letter from the laboratory where the total coliform sample was reportedly analyzed, stating that the report was falsified; and

Whereas, on March 25, 2024, TCEH received total coliform sample results submitted for the release of the Boil Water Order issued on March 14, 2024. These laboratory reports were also determined to be falsified; and

Furthermore, we did not receive a sample from Mr. Brewer on 11/20/23. Our records indicate that in 2023, we received one sample for Tc/E. coli for 1384 Dryden Rd., Ithaca, NY, and the report was issued on 4/26/23 for sample ID# I-4753. We can provide supporting documentation if requested.

To whom it may concern,

On Monday March 25th I received a call from the Tompkins County Health Department after submitting two water sampling reports that were provided to me after having an employee drop these tests of for sampling.

I then received a call from Skip Parr, notifying me that these reports were altered, and not accurate for the samples I had instructed to be delivered.

As I was visiting my sister in Charleston, I arrived back in town the afternoon of March 25th and asked about these reports.

Back in November, we had a new employee start who had made us aware of some health issues he faced, but we had brought him on anyway as we felt he would be a good fit, and he needed employment. During these first few weeks, and offer was made that he could drop a November water sample off for us as he was working a very limited schedule due to his health and could use the extra funds to do the running around and emailing me the reports for submittal.

His health continued to decline, and as he was only working around 5-8 hours per week, I figured allowing him to deliver the samples to remove our boil water notice would get some extra money in his pocket and help me out as I was getting ready to head out of town and visit my sister.

As it turns out, an old report dated from 2022 was altered three total times, and these water samples did not get to the lab at all. The roughly \$72 per test was pocketed, and I am assuming we honestly would not have caught on unless an individual at the health department realized the issues. These forms were readily available in our email, as I have always saved any water testing report in a single folder for easy access.

While this employee was terminated, and access to our email account (Brew22coffee@gmail.com) removed, I do however take full responsibility for this incident, with something of importance such as water samples, this absolutely should have been a process I performed myself to ensure chain of custody, but at the same time, I did not think altering a form was a possibility.

CNY and Cook Properties NY intend to apply for a new permit making CNY, the owner and intended operator, of the Hanshaw Village Mobile Home Park.



Refund Policy; Removal of refund fee

In 2011, Environmental Health (EH) developed a refund policy approved by the Board of Health. The policy included a \$25 refund processing fee to cover administrative costs.

On average, the Division processes 15-20 refunds annually. However, EH generally only recovers \$100 in total revenue from the refund processing fee. Many refunds are due applicants applying for a permit that is not required, where we don't charge the \$25 for each refund.

Considering the additional administrative burden in tracking and applying the refund processing fee and the minimal financial benefit gained, EH is proposing to eliminate the \$25 refund processing fee effective January 1, 2025, and request the Board's approval of the attached revised refund policy.

Environmental Health Division Policy for Refunds of Permit, Application and Plan Review Fees Draft for BOH Review May 2024

Background:

The Tompkins County Environmental Health Division receives fees from the public for water system operations, onsite wastewater system applications, realty subdivision developments, permits to operate, plan reviews, and other services. This policy addresses those instances when the Division receives a request for a refund of these fees.

Policy:

- 1. There will be a \$25 processing fee for any refund issued by the Division. Refunds may take 2 4 weeks to process.
- 2. For operating and facility permit fees, refunds will be issued to the applicant upon request if the request is received within 6 months of the issue date of the permit and if the facility has not operated and if the permit has not expired.
- 3. For other application and plan review fees, refunds will be issued upon request if the request is received within 6 months of the submittal date of the application or plan and if the Division technical staff has not conducted a field visit or spent more than 1 hour reviewing the submittal.
- 4. Requests for fee refunds received within 6 months from the date of permit issuance or application or plan submittal may be issued for extenuating circumstances (e.g., in case of death or serious emergencies) with the approval of the Environmental Health Director.
- Applicants that are denied a refund may submit a written statement or speak during privilege of the floor at a regularly scheduled Board of Health meeting to ask the Board to consider their request.

The information in this packet addresses our proposed facility operating and plan review fees and other revenue projections for 2025.

We saw little change in our proposed cost to revenue recovery in most programs and are therefore only proposing the following changes to our fees:

- Onsite Wastewater Treatment System (OWTS) Fees:
 - OWTS Replacement Permit w/ Plans Fee: We are proposing to add the discount for replacement systems, with no site evaluation, that was removed in 2024. Until prior to 2024, we are now seeing an increased number of applications received by outside engineers that fall into this category.
 - OWTS Plan Review Fee: We are proposing a 10% increase in the OWTS plan review fee design rates for 1,000-1,999 and 2,000+ gallons per day. We are seeing a slight decrease in our cost recovery due to the review time involved for these larger systems.
 - OWTS Application Renewal Fee: We currently have the discretion to waive the permit renewal fee/transfer and are adding the same discretion to the application renewal/transfer fee.
- Refund Request Fee: We are proposing to eliminate the \$25 refund processing fee in accordance with the proposed revised policy.







