Food:

Responding to Community Needs

- Schools Delivering between 7,700-8,000 meals a day. Schools are partnering with a local food pantry to deliver groceries, diapers, formula, laundry detergent, etc.
- Foodnet has delivered 14 days of frozen meals to ~650 seniors. Continuing to deliver meals bi-daily to limit contact (calling on days of not delivering).
- Foodbank & Food Pantries over 80,000 pounds of food delivered (April 2). Cornell distributed 16,000 pounds.

Childcare:

Responding to Community Needs

- 115 spots available for essential workers in licensed day care facilities – 17 used – some part-time.
- Registered facilities (in-home childcare) have not closed.



Community Responses to Those Experiencing Homelessness

- Telehealth within Southwest Park began on 4/6/2020 for medical needs
- Outreach workers have provided masks to all people in Southwest Park
- People have been able to move from the dewatering sight
- Continuing to work with community partners for solutions to support those who may not have a home to quarantine or isolate within






Needs Identified from Tompkins County 2-1-1 Contacts Since March 13, 2020













Food Distribution

School Districts, Foodnet, and Food Banks continue to report the same ongoing numbers as presented on 4/21.



TC3 Food Pantry – On April 24th, 450 families received 50 pounds of food each (meat, dairy, protein, etc). 60% of families were new to the Food Bank.

Baby formula and diapers were provided for over 50 families.

5 County employees distriubted food to 22 people who couldn't make it to the site.

There will be another TC3 Food Pantry on May 21st.








Age Range




Race




Ethnicity







Daily Active Cases + 7-Day Avg. New Cases





COVID-19 Vaccination Planning



- Tompkins County has submitted their COVID-19 Vaccination Plan to NYS DOH as of mid-November which is currently pending review. The plan directly references Tompkins County's Public Health Emergency Preparedness Plan and Medical Countermeasure (MCM) Plan.
- Initial planning meetings have been held with both Cayuga Health Systems and Long-Term Care Facilities to plan for initial phase of distribution to Phase I priority populations as outlined in the NYS Vaccination Plan.
- MOUs with potential Open POD (Points of Dispensing) locations have been reviewed and locations contacted to confirm availability to serve as a location for COVID-19 vaccination. Additional open POD locations have been brainstormed in each municipality.
- No timeline, amount of vaccine, or other information has been made available by NYS DOH at this time.
- Updates will be posted on TCHD website.

In addition to the three existing micro-cluster zone levels (Yellow, Orange and Red), New York will add a new "Emergency Stop" level, which will effectively put that area under the NY on PAUSE guidelines from the spring. This new level would be used if a hospital system in that area was at serious risk of becoming overwhelmed.

- Appointments required for both sites



Tompkins County Health Department Contact Tracing Capacity

Definitions:

Case investigations are communicating with a positive case to identify close contacts and assess health-related concerns.

Contact tracing is the process of contacting all people who've had contact with someone who tested positive for COVID-19.

Daily Check-in Calls are with individuals who are close contacts and/or in quarantine.

TCHD continues to report ability to complete necessary investigations, tracing, and daily check-in calls.

- 47 County staff have completed Johns Hopkins contact tracing training. In addition to 21 HD nurses & 11 other HD staff.
- Scheduling system implemented, ability to scale up on as-needed basis. 9-10 assigned each day.
- Ongoing conversations with Cornell University to utilize MPH students to assist. Cornell Health completes check in calls of Cornell students.



New York State's Winter Approach to Combat COVID-19 Surge

Strategy 1: Manage Hospital Capacity to Enhance and Equalize Care

• Shifting focus to number of hospitalizations, hospital capacity: adding hospitalization rate, case rate, available beds, ICU beds, death rate, and patient load management to zone designations

Strategy 2: Increase and Balance Testing Resources and Availability

- Under the Winter Plan, New York State will take steps to increase the amount of testing available statewide, but do so in a way that ensures distribution is balanced with testing sufficient across different segments of the population, including:
 - Healthcare workers;
 - Nursing homes;
 - •Schools;
 - Essential workers;
 - Business professionals;
 - Personal services testing; and
 - •General population, returning students and travelers, etc.

Strategy 3: Keep Schools Open Safely

- Schools urged to keep K-8 open whenever it is safe, recognizing low rate of spread in schools
- Testing requirements in red and orange zones

Strategy 4: Prevent Viral Spread from Small Gatherings

NYS public education campaign on small gatherings

Strategy 5: Operationalize an Equitable and Safe Vaccination Program



On 12/11/20 the Governor's office <u>suggested</u> that State contact tracers have only been able to identify the source of exposure for an est. **20%** of the state's positive cases.

The Tompkins County Health Department has been able to identify the source of exposure of **56%** of positive cases.






