

THE STORY BEHIND THE DATA

GRAPH 1: # **of youth served** – Of the 121 youth served, 43 of those youth attending our summer camps and 6 were youth were served in special programs during the summer in an effort to reach those not receiving much support. Doing collaborative programs with BOCES, South Hill, DeWitt and Boynton schools. RSS has hired well qualified staff to provide successful programming, as well as a behavioral consultant to train the summer staff on how to work successfully with youth with disabilities. RSS also collaborated with camp directors and the Recreation Department of the Youth Bureau to identify youth with special needs during the application process.

GRAPH 2: % of youth with disabilities that have increased their social skills. – RSS saw a slight increase in social skills, partially as a result of the longevity of relationships with youth in program. Also reflects success in participation at summer camp. Trusting relationships are key, staff are very good and have high levels of emotional intelligence and compassion. Longer relationships between the youth and the staff leads to more success with social skills. It is the hope that success rates will increase over time as the staff get to know the youth better and develop relationships with them.

GRAPH 3: % of youth with disabilities in RSS supported Inclusion programs that participate in activities with their typical peers 25% of the time. - This measure is captured annually during Quarter 3 only, to measure summer camp inclusion. Staff training and education helps staff to better work with and understand the needs of youth, long term relationships with the same youth and the same staff allows for more successes and training the general camp staff to understand their role in inclusion all contribute to progress in this measure.
