Call to Order: Dr. Moylan called the regular meeting of the Board of Health (BOH) to order at noon.

Privilege of the Floor: None

Approval of September 24, 2024, BOH Minutes: Ms. Black moved to approve the minutes from September 24, 2024, and Dr. Koppel seconded the motion. All were in favor of approving the minutes, and the motion carried.

Financial Summary: Mr. Porter had nothing to add to his written report included in the packet. The team is currently making year-end budget adjustments.

Medical Director's Report and Discussion: Dr. Klepack reported that it is Domestic Violence Protection Month. Lead Poisoning prevention is also this week. A joint outreach between EH and the Reuse Center is this afternoon. Items the public brings in will be tested for lead Materials and staff will provide education about lead poisoning. Paint and contaminated soils are the major sources of poisoning in the region.

Dr. Moylan appreciated Dr. Klepack bringing awareness to the public that the adult tick season has begun.

Administration Report: Mr. Kruppa announced that the Mental Health Clinic on Brown Road is set to have a soft launch opening on November 12th. A formal announcement will follow in a few months after gauging capacity. Using existing clinicians, the clinic will initially focus on providing services to children, youth, and current clients. Current clients have been contacted regarding their interest in the new location option. New clients seeking intake appointments will soon have both location options available.

Division for Community Health (DCH) Report: Ms. Buckwalter had nothing to add to her report that was included in the packet. She stated that two nurses have already been hired, and another nurse is set to begin on November 12th. This new nurse will concentrate on general child health, especially during the back-to-school immunization season when the number of children seeking immunizations rises significantly. Families face several barriers in accessing primary care for immunizations, including social determinants of health such as transportation challenges and lack of insurance.

Health Promotion Program Report: Ms. Hillson reported completing the community health worker interview process and the new hire will start on Monday, October 28th.

Dr. Moylan thanked Ms. Hillson for the COVID-19 fidget balls used in a flu vaccination exercise on campus at Ithaca College, where 450 to 475 vaccinations were given.

Children with Special Care Needs (CSCN) Report: Ms. Clark Manderville had nothing to add to her written report included in the packet. The team is currently focused on learning about the recently launched Early Intervention (EI) system from the New York State Department of Health, which collects information on children receiving EI services.

Environmental Health (EH) Report: Ms. Cameron had nothing to add to her written report included in the packet.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

Enforcement Actions:

MEDICAL DIRECTOR REPORT

October 2024 Report | BOH Meeting December 3, 2024

Members of the Board receive my Practitioners' Bulletin as I produce them. I will be repeating topics that I have covered there.

Immunizations

Over the past decade and more, we have seen a growth in locations delivering vaccines. However, this growth in the number of locations has not been matched by each location delivering all or even most of the vaccines that are ACIP-approved. At present, we see challenges in our fellow citizens accessing some vaccines.

For example, primary care offices do not always deliver COVID-19 vaccines while generally, pharmacies do. Pharmacies are unlikely to offer more than a very limited number of childhood vaccines and even for the ones they do they generally will not vaccinate a child under 3 and some use an older age limit. MPOX vaccine is generally only available through Whole Health's immunization clinic. Medicare limits the delivery of a few adult vaccines to only pharmacies.

One of the factors is economics. As "Your Local Epidemiologist" reports: Physicians do not get paid by pharmaceutical companies for vaccinations. Vaccination is often billed to insurance companies. But these administration fees are rarely worth it. Surveys of pediatricians' report that most break even or even lose money from vaccination—because the costs of vaccine storage, handling, and the doses themselves are so high. Some insurers have regional programs offering small financial incentives to pediatric practices for maintaining a certain level of vaccine uptake in their practices, but these programs are not universal, and the incentives are indeed small. The cost of vaccinating kids has gotten so high that some pediatric practices have stopped offering recommended vaccines.

Whenever the full spectrum of vaccines cannot be delivered at every point of care a barrier is created. People are busy and having to go two places for vaccination when one could have been sufficient means that some people will not bother. Every time a person falls ill due to a vaccine-preventable illness society spends far more for their care than vaccination would have cost.

Locally we try to mitigate these problems by messaging the public regarding where to find vaccines. And we offer in our vaccine clinics all the vaccines feasible to the under and uninsured. We have not gotten into vaccinating people with commercial or public insurance which covers immunization due to staff and financial considerations and a belief that we need to support regional practices providing a medical home for the individual by urging the public to be vaccinated at their practitioners. However,

the developments over the past few years are concerning since we know that minimal vaccination rates are necessary to control the spread of vaccine-preventable diseases.

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE AND HEALTH (AI DOES NOT MEAN ACTUAL INTELLIGENCE)

The Center for Science in the Public Interest reports that "Al Overview" which now pops up at the top of nearly every Google search provides information that is unsupported by evidence or wrong. Al statements most often have a link icon after each one. If one follows the link one can get to the source of the statement. Often, it's a company selling a product Al is recommending. Information offered is not vetted so it is not based on best evidence. It is based on the frequency which a claim shows up on the internet. In addition, they found that Al's answers will change should you ask a question on different days or use different devices. We in public health need to be prepared to counsel the public regarding the inadequacy of current Al to give important health information.

Practitioner Shortages with a Focus on Primary Care

We have a shortage and unless we change it will get worse – the population of the U.S. is predicted to grow until 2040 and then plateau (only because of immigration). The plateau will see the over-60 population increase as we age, and equal numbers of people will be alive at all ages – unlike today. The U.S. population is predicted to grow by 10.6% from around 328 million people to 363 million people. There's a projected increase of about 42.4% in those 65 and older, meaning the demand for physicians is only expected to go up. This Spectrum News piece, <u>Upstate N.Y. Doctor Warns of Dangers of Physician Shortage</u>, is from May 2023.

THE FACTORS LEADING TO THIS SHORTAGE ARE MANY:

Practitioners tend to locate in areas they are familiar with from growing up or living in them. Urban areas are attractive to practitioners due to the amenities available.

Economic – Medicaid and Medicare – For the past 3 or so years payment to practitioners has dropped each year due to Congressional inactivity. Most care networks are oriented to orthopedic, cardiac, and other particular specialties which tend to be more lucrative due to the procedures they perform in their facilities.

Social – Medical schools don't typically recruit with an eye to where a person comes from – if the practitioner is from a rural upbringing, they are more likely to return to a rural setting. Rural areas are most in need of physicians generally. Yet, no priority is given to recruiting medical students who have rural roots.

Location of medical schools – typically urban – students likely to practice urban.


Work burden - Primary care has become the specialty particularly overburdened with paperwork and work that no one else wants to do — it eats into their time with family, friends, and recreation to recharge their energy.

In an interview with <u>the Conversation</u>, Amir Pasic, the dean of the Indiana University Lilly School of Philanthropy, noted that "just waiving tuition — which <u>costs about \$65,000 annually for four years</u> — and doing business as usual won't make a difference." Instead, Pasic said, medical schools need to create a culture that "encourages and expects their alumni" to work as primary-care doctors or in low-income communities.

Making medical school tuition-free also does not solve the <u>economic challenges</u> of pursuing a career in primary care or working in an underserved area. Corporations are <u>consolidating primary-care practices</u>, and private-equity acquisitions <u>of medical practices</u> are <u>rising 20 percent a year</u>, which makes health care increasingly oriented to efficiency and profit. Meanwhile, people endure long waiting lists and rushed provider visits. Doctors are limited by the pressures of profitability, the amount of staff time and expertise to negotiate with for-profit insurers, and patients' reluctance to seek health care when deductibles are high.

So primary care-trained physicians are choosing to practice in areas where they don't do all areas of primary care. They are going into focused practices like urgent care, telemedicine options that allow providers to work remotely, and part-time work.

New York has an insufficient supply of primary care providers statewide, according to a new <u>"scorecard" by the Primary Care Development Corporation</u>.

There are roughly 111.7 primary care providers per 100,000 residents in NYS, although the rate is far lower in rural areas of the state, the nonprofit found.

Access varies by region for Medicaid enrollees: About 80 percent of primary care providers statewide accept Medicaid, but in Manhattan just 63 percent do.

"Primary care saves lives, leads to better individual and community health, is central to health equity, and reduces overall health care costs. Yet primary care in New York is undervalued and underfunded, leaving many individuals and communities without adequate care," the nonprofit wrote.

To address healthcare workforce shortages, Gov. Kathy Hochul has repeatedly proposed loosening New York's scope-of-practice regulations to allow healthcare workers to perform a broader array of tasks under their licenses, as well as joining interstate licensure compacts that would enable practitioners licensed by other states to work in New York more readily.

The Primary Care Development Corporation's scorecard shows that the majority of primary care providers in New York are physicians. Twenty-five percent are nurse practitioners and 6 percent are physician assistants.

State lawmakers have resisted.

One bill pending in the Legislature, sponsored by state Assemblymember Amy Paulin and Sen. Gustavo Rivera, would require that at least 12.5 percent of health care spending be for primary care services.

Nationally primary care accounts for over a third of all health care visits each year but only about 5 to 7 percent of all health care expenditures, according to the Primary Care Development Corporation.

But it's unclear exactly how much New York spends on primary care because there is no readily available data that includes all the state's healthcare facilities and claims from all types of health insurance plans.

Whole Health Highlights

- On 11/12 the Mental Health satellite clinic had a soft opening at 55 Brown Road. We have one full time clinician and several that rotate from Green Street. We expect to build client base over the next couple months. A formal grand opening will happen in early 2025.
- There continue to be issues with the new NYS Early Intervention system EI Hub. Staff have been
 working to keep up with the needs of children while the system is worked on. There is a lot of
 frustration from counties and providers. The complications are causing more work and putting
 timely reimbursements at risk. NYSACHO has set up regular calls for counties to get updates and
 provide feedback to the vendor that created the system.

Strategic Planning/Merger

INTEGRATION:

Merge the department structures to become one organization and increase our ability to better serve our clients and community.

- Our Client-Needs CFT is also working towards identifying internal processes & capacity related to client intake and referrals to identify any areas for improvement.
- Our Internal-Efficiency CFT conducted a staff survey where they collected information about
 efficiencies in different areas of Whole Health and gathered information on things such as which
 types of programs/technologies different staff members are utilizing. Next, they will work
 together to analyze findings.

CULTURE:

Align the organization around our shared mission and values-based culture to create an empowered, engaged, and cohesive team.

Our DEIB CFT is working in two small groups, one of which is a Cultural Alignment Team. This
team is working to review and evaluate different tools or frameworks that we could employ to
measure cultural alignment in our organization and amongst staff.

COMMUNITY:

Strengthen the collaborative effort within Tompkins County to equitably impact individual and population health.

• Our Client-Needs CFT has collected qualitative data from some of our external partners that will be used towards developing a more efficient and effective client intake and referral process.

Our DEIB CFT is working in two small groups, one of which is a Data Collection Team which will
work together to decide on specific demographic factors to measure and will work towards

Highlights:

Communicable Disease:

NOTABLE COMMUNICABLE DISEASE INVESTIGATIONS IN OCTOBER:

- Campylobacter 1 case, involved travel to another state, resolved after ED visit
- Cryptosporidiosis 1 case, not related to travel, 10 days of symptoms, resolved
- E. Coli Shiga Toxin 1 case which is linked to the national e-coli outbreak (0121), case unable to be interviewed
- Salmonella 2 cases, one in chronically ill young adult who needed IV antibiotics, one has had repeated Salmonella UTI but with no GI symptoms
- Strep, Group A Invasive -1 case, 57 yo with many comorbidities, continues to be hospitalized for over a month
- Malaria 1 case with travel to Africa, deceased, did not take preventive malarial treatment. They are also a probable babesia case
- Pertussis 7 cases (1 revoked) 5 cases are probable, 1 is lab confirmed; all fully vaccinated college aged population
- West Nile Virus 1 case, boating and outdoor activities on Seneca Lake
- Anaplasmosis 10 cases, some also with Lyme, elderly poorly affected
- Babesiosis 3 cases: 1 hospitalized, 1 case with probable status and co-infected with malaria, deceased

IMMUNIZATIONS

- Immunizations have slowed down a bit. Our Friday clinics are still full, but there are no longer any double bookings or the need to add a Tuesday clinic. There were 37 children and 27 adults vaccinated at our on-site clinic during the month of October.
- Mobile vaccination clinics were set up at 5 locations for Covid and Influenza vaccines in October:
 McGraw House- Oct. 1—63 people vaccinated (senior housing)

Lifelong- Oct. 3—26 people vaccinated (senior center)

Juniper Manor- Oct. 10—22 people vaccinated (senior housing)

Ellis Hollow- Oct. 15—17 people vaccinated (senior housing)

Open Doors English- 21 people vaccinated (those learning English as a second language)

Total=149 people vaccinated at mobile clinics in October

Vaccination was also completed for homebound individuals during the month of October. 5
people were vaccinated against Covid and/or Influenza in their homes.

• 7 people at STAP (Southern Tier Aids Program) were vaccinated against Mpox at their State St. Location.

WIC

- We have a vacant Breastfeeding Peer Counselor position.
- Enrollment in September increased by 42 participants and our participation (utilizing WIC benefits) increased by 47 participants.
- Enrollment stayed the same in October. We served 480 individuals, 395 scheduled appointments, 19 didn't show for their appointment and 85 walk-in appointments.

Program Updates

SAFECARE PROGRAM

- New nurse Rose Goosen will go through SafeCare training starting in December.
- SafeCare accreditation is in process. Two coaching sessions will be completed and then accreditation will be granted.
- Currently 1 family is enrolled in this program and is making progress towards completion with regular home visits.

MOMS PLUS+

- Two MOMS Plus+ nurses are continuing their CLC training and making home visits. Our newest MOMS Plus+ nurse, Rose Goosen, has just begun her CLC training and is going out on many home visits.
- Our MOMS Plus+ nurse Emily admitted a high-risk pediatric client during October 2024. We are the only home visiting nurse program in Tompkins County that will admit children under the age of 8. We are getting pediatric referrals from Crouse Hospital for weight checks on high-risk babies being discharged from the NICU.
- MOMS Plus+ nurses completed 55 home visits in October 2024, down a few from September 2024.
- There were 58 referrals made to the MOMS Plus+ program during October 2024, the same number of referrals made in September 2024.
- There were 14 new admissions to the MOMS Plus+ program in October 2024, down from 16 in September 2024.
 - There are currently 56 clients enrolled in the MOMS Plus+ program as of the end of October 2024 compared with 57 clients enrolled in September 2024.

RABIES

CHS nurses administered 24 rabies vaccination to patients in the month of October. The
majority of them were due to exposure to bats or cats and dogs that could not be located.
There was one exposure resulting from a horse bite in Vietnam.

• In comparison, 307 rabies vaccinations were administered all of last year (2023). A total of 326 rabies vaccinations have been administered between January and October of this year.

LEAD

- There are currently 19 children receiving nursing case management for elevated blood lead levels. There was one new admission during the month of October.
- October 22-26 was Lead poisoning prevention week. TCWH partnered with Eco-Testing Services
 to hold a Lead Awareness event at the Ithaca ReUse Center on October 22. Staff provided
 information and answered questions. Several items submitted by community members were
 tested on-site for lead.
- A lead door hangar campaign was also completed on Oct. 26 in the town of Groton.

HIV

- Community Health nurses did 4 HIV tests at STAP and 1 HIV test at Brown Rd Clinic during the month of October 2024
- We are considering expanding our HIV testing locations to include Loaves and Fishes and Amici House. Planning is underway to go to these locations in December.

- SLP hired by the county has picked up children off the therapy needs list. The SLP had 25 visits a week so far with more potential each week as her caseload grows.
- The proposal for the reallocation of funds to keep 2 positions and to allow for current providers to receive a stipend per service rendered, including ongoing services and evaluations has been approved by the legislator. Contacts with all therapists have been completed and sent out for private providers and agencies to sign.
- The other provider position at the county is still open and on all platforms being advertised. No more inquiries have been made.

Highlights

Potential Drought: NYSDEC has declared drought watches or warnings for all New York State regions because of a significant shortage of rainfall and declining levels in streamflow and ground water. New York City is concerned about low water levels in their drinking water reservoirs and residents are urged to conserve water. In response to water shortage concerns, NYSDOH reached out to all local health departments requesting information on key reservoirs that may be of concern. The City of Ithaca's drinking water reservoir was on the list in Tompkins County. As of November 18, the City is not experiencing any unusual water quality concerns, water levels are not a current concern, and rain is forecast in the near future.

2024 Environmental Health Summit: Ellie Nierstedt and Doug Barnes attended the 2024 Environmental Health Summit in Albany on October 23. The focus of the summit was on Climate Change and Impacts on Environmental Health. Topics discussed include climate change and health impacts; emerging pathogens and infectious diseases; action planning for local adaptation and mitigation; impacts of climate change on sources of drinking water; food protection, recreational environmental health, and healthy neighborhoods; and worker safety.

Lead Awareness Workshop: As part of National Lead Poisoning Prevention Week, TCWH partnered with Eco-Testing Services to hold a Lead Awareness event at the Ithaca ReUse Center on October 22 between 2:30-5PM. TCWH staff provided information and answered questions as well as testing items brought by community members for the presence of lead. Some of the items tested provided surprising results to the owners, and their newfound knowledge about their items will likely change their usage of them. We had a steady flow of people, some of whom really engaged in conversation with our staff in both English and Spanish. Among our visitors were several contractors who work on homes in our community. TCWH is grateful to Ithaca's ReUse Center for graciously hosting our event and we hope to continue with events like this on an ongoing basis. Thanks to René Borgella, Mike Robson, and Chris Laverack from EH; Samantha Hillson and Diana Crouch from HPP; and a special thanks to Daryl Heffron from Eco-Testing Services for attending and providing XRF testing for the presence of lead.

Groton Rabies Clinic: On October 18th, Environmental Health hosted a free rabies clinic at the Groton Fire Station. At the clinic, a total of 109 cats and dogs were vaccinated. Environmental Health would like to extend our gratitude and appreciation to all the veterinarian staff (Dr. Jeanne Ramsey, Dr. Jessica Piga, and Cindy Corina) as well as the EH staff that participated – (Dillon Shults, René Borgella, Nicole Piston, Doug Barnes, Scott Freyburger, and Bee Walsh).

Restaurant Donated Food Guidance: In October, at the request of the Friendship Donation Network and in coordination with Tompkins County Recycling and Materials Management, EH distributed the NYSDEC Document titled "Food Donation and Food Scraps Recycling Law - Guidance for New York State Businesses" to all permitted food service establishments. This document discusses potential benefits of food donation and provides information on best practices for donating prepared food. Permitted food service establishments are able to donate prepared food to food relief organizations as long as it has not been served or otherwise contaminated and has been held at proper temperatures (see page 13). Pages 12-14 of this handout provide good information on donating food safely.

CEHD Fall Meeting: Skip Parr and Liz Cameron attended the Conference of Environmental Health Directors (CEHD) Fall meeting from October 7 to 9 at the Minnowbrook Conference Center at Blue Mountain Lake, NY. The NYS Lead Rental Registry and implementation of the lead service line inventory requirements for public water supplies were discussed at the technical session on Tuesday, along with updates from the New York State Association of County Health Officials (NYSACHO), NYS Ag & Markets, and other NYSDOH Bureaus. Note that Tompkins County is not one of the counties currently required to implement a lead rental registry program. The issues associated with vaping products under ATUPA were also discussed at the business meeting on Wednesday.

Human Resources: Tom Palmer, Environmental Health Specialist, resigned from EH effective 11/20/24. Tom has accepted a position with NYSDOH based in Albany as a field coordinator. Tom will be greatly missed for the excellent work he has provided to the division over the last two and a half years, especially in the water program this last year. We wish Tom all the best as he transitions to his new position.



Shelter

The Environmental Health Division requests approval from the Board of Health to waive the fees for a permit to operate for the food service establishment at the Department of Social Services (DSS) "Code Blue" Warming Shelters.

"Code Blue" is a New York State mandated program that requires counties to provide shelter to unhoused people when temperatures go below freezing typically from the end of October to April. DSS is creating a new shelter for this program and individuals will be housed at 300 Tioga St., Ithaca (the former Key Bank), and families will be housed at the Econo Lodge in the Village of Lansing.

Several area churches would like to provide simple meals at these locations. DSS has been working with Environmental Health to obtain a Food Service Permit for this, with the churches operating under their permit. The Division would like Board of Health approval to waive the FSE permit fee for DSS. We would also like to waive the fee for any churches looking to certify their kitchen in an effort to help provide food to the shelters and with no plans to use the kitchen outside of their normal church functions.

The Division would like to waive the fees to allow more funds to be used to address food inequality and to help eliminate barriers to permitting for any churches that may be willing to certify their kitchens for this program. DSS will receive a Medium Risk permit to provide food at the two locations (\$375 fee in 2024). If changes are made to the food service operation at the shelters in the future, or if an approved church expands the use of the kitchen (such as being rented out to other groups for use as a commissary kitchen), we will reassess the waiver to determine if a fee should be assessed.

Respiratory Virus Vaccines

Seasonal flu, COVID-19, and RSV are each caused by a virus that affects the respiratory system. They are all spread primarily through airborne particles. Even healthy people can get sick from these viruses and it can be serious. All of their vaccines are safe and effective.

Everyone age 6 months and older should get a flu vaccine every year, and a COVID-19 vaccine when updated and as recommended. The RSV vaccine is recommended during pregnancy, for some infants at high risk, and for older adults. Contact your physician if you think you might be eligible for the RSV vaccine.
