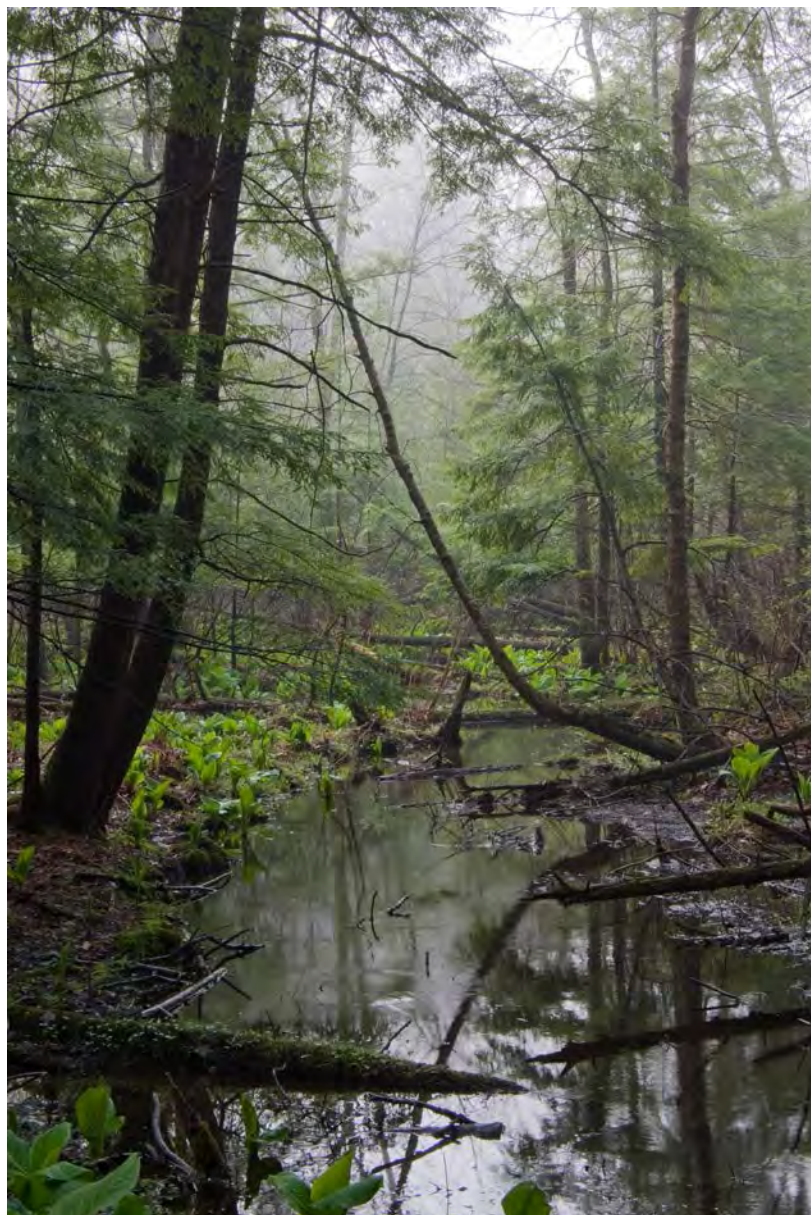

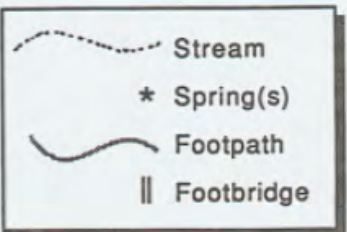

# Cement company to construct \$1 million plant

DRYDEN — DeWitt Cement Co. of Pavilion wants to construct a \$700,000 to \$1 million ready-mix concrete plant on the old Alfred Eddy property on West Malloryville Road, a spokesman said.

Douglas Hicks, DeWitt's vice president in charge of marketing, said in a recent interview that the company has applied to the town and the state Department of Environmental Conservation for a mining permit to extract gravel.

Patrick Snyder, associate environmental analyst with the DEC in Cortland, said DeWitt has applied for five permits — one to mine the gravel and four for air quality permits to allow the company to operate processing equipment.

Hicks said the equipment would include crushing and screening equipment for sand and gravel and the ready-mix concrete plant.

The sand and gravel operation would employ about four people and the concrete plant another 10, Hicks said.

Dewitt now supplies Schuyler and Tompkins County customers from a ready-mix plant in Burdett. With a Dryden plant, Hicks said, the company "would hope to increase our market share in Tompkins County."

The next step is for the company to submit a draft environmental impact statement. When the applications are complete and the draft environmental impact statement is complete, they will be distributed for public comment.

After mining 78 acres of gravel, Dewitt would leave a 15-acre pond on the site, Snyder said.

Hicks said the company would like to have the paperwork complete in time to begin mining on the 110-acre plot in the spring. The next step is sit down with DEC officials and others to "identify areas of concern," Hicks said. Then the DEC will determine in what depth it wants the environmental impact statement done, he said. No date has been set for the conference with DEC officials.

The company expects that it will take 12 to 15 years to complete the mining. After that, the land would be reclaimed and returned to agricultural use, Hicks said.

Owner Alfred Eddy formerly operated a gravel pit at the site, he said.

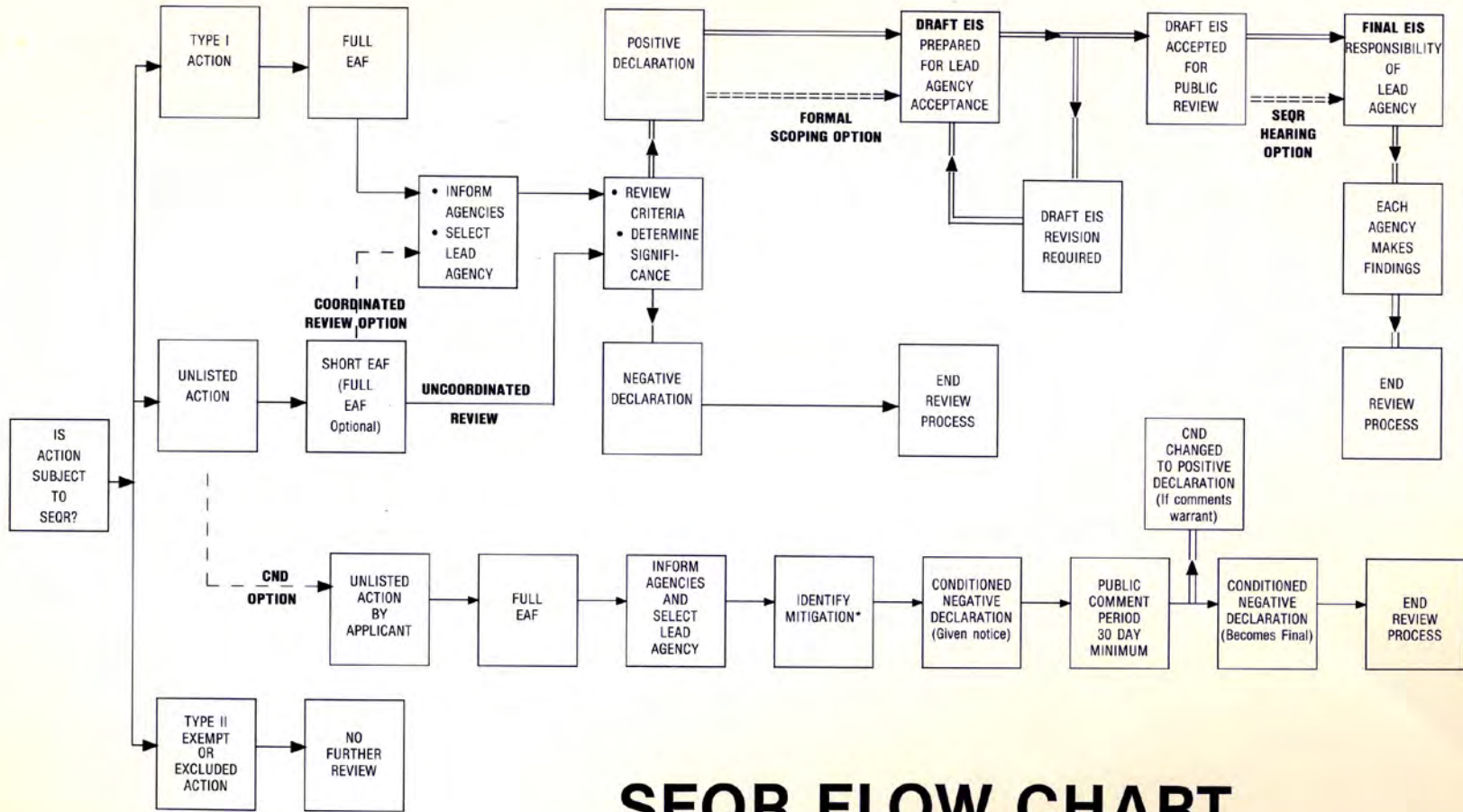
